Introduction

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under Sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of the registered early years provision. 'Early years provision' refers to provision regulated by Ofsted for children from birth to 31 August following their fifth birthday (the early years age group). The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and welfare, known as the *Early Years Foundation Stage*.

The report includes information on any complaints about the childcare provision which Ofsted has received since the last inspection or registration whichever is the later, which require Ofsted or the provider to take action in Annex C.

The provider must provide a copy of this report to all parents with children at the setting where reasonably practicable. The provider must provide a copy of the report to any other person who asks for one, but may charge a fee for this service (The Childcare (Inspection) Regulations 2008 regulations 9 and 10).

The setting also makes provision for children older than the early years age group which is registered on the voluntary and/or compulsory part(s) of the Childcare Register. This report does not include an evaluation of that provision, but a comment about compliance with the requirements of the Childcare Register is included in Annex B.

Description of the childminding

The childminder has been registered since 1985. She lives with her husband and two adult children in the Turnpike Lane area of the London borough of Haringey. Entrance is accessed via a step from the street to the front garden and a step into the house. The ground floor rear sitting and dining area, toilet and fully enclosed garden are used for childminding. The childminder walks to the children centre four times a week. The family has a cat, a dog and fish.

The childminder is able to provide care each weekday during term-time and school holidays. She is registered to care for three children in the Early Years Foundation Stage and there are currently two children attending who are within this age group. The childminder is also registered to care for children aged five years to eight years. Children occupying these places share the same facilities as the children in the early years age range. There are currently no children on roll in this age group. This provision is registered by Ofsted on the Early Years Register, and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She is a member of the National Childminding Association.

Overall effectiveness of the early years provision

Overall, the childminder provides well for all children in the Early Years Foundation Stage. She provides a safe and stimulating environment, supporting all children to ensure that they are and feel included.

All children are able to participate in the range of exciting activities offered. They are making progress in their learning and development because the childminder has a very good understanding of how children learn through play.

The childminder is beginning to evaluate her practice and through this evaluation she aims to develop and improve her childminding practice.

What steps need to be taken to improve provision further?

To further improve the early years provision the registered person should:

- record what treatment is given after any accidents in the accident record
- update knowledge on current safeguarding procedures.

The leadership and management of the early years provision

The childminder has clear written policies and procedures in place which are organised to ensure that all the children are well protected. The childminder is beginning to evaluate the strengths and areas for improvement in her daily practise. Through this evaluation, she has concluded that attending training on safeguarding children will be beneficial to her practice.

The childminder has a safeguarding procedure, with contact telephone numbers should she have a concern about the welfare of a child; this ensures that children are protected. She has a clear understanding of issues relating to safeguarding children and has the relevant information and contact details for all children. She completes a regular risk assessment of her home and ensures that toys and resources are suitable and safe. Children are learning about keeping themselves safe when walking near roads, and when it is safe to cross.

The childminder regularly discusses the children's development and progress with parents and carers, including what activities the children have enjoyed at the children's centre. The children have individual folders which are effectively used to share information on activities and achievements with parents and carers, who are encouraged to share what they know about their children in order to support the children's learning and development. Children's individual starting points and development is discussed and activities are provided to promote their development and progress. This means that children make good progress, given their age, ability and starting points.

The childminder is aware of developing effective links with other provisions delivering the Early Years Foundation Stage. However, the children do not currently attend any pre-school groups.

The quality and standards of the early years provision

Children's individual needs are well met by the childminder who ensures that she really knows the likes, dislikes and abilities of the children in her care. She is able to converse with the children in English and Italian. The children's good health and welfare are her priority. The childminder provides home cooked healthy meals and snacks, which are well balanced and take into account any specific dietary needs. She ensures that the children have fresh fruit or vegetables every day, therefore encouraging them to eat healthily. She takes effective steps to ensure that any accidents are effectively dealt with and recorded, however, she does not record what treatment was given. She talks to the children about germs and encourages them to clean their hands before eating; this effectively promotes their understanding of being healthy.

The childminder provides an interesting range of indoor and outdoor activities including regular visits to the local children's centre. The childminder provides children with access to a good range of quality resources in her home which are suitable for the children's ages and stages of development. The activities provided for children promote their social, intellectual and physical skills. She observes the children to understand where they are in their learning and knows what activities to offer them in order to promote their development. Therefore, she meets the children's individual needs and provides achievable challenges to enable the children to make sound progress towards the early learning goals.

The childminder ensures that all children are included and offered the same opportunities which are adapted effectively to suit their individual needs and

interests. She encourages children to develop appropriate behaviour and effectively uses praise and affection to encourage children to learn right from wrong.

The children are cared for in a secure environment because the childminder has a very good understanding of minimising risks. She carries out a regular risk assessment of her home and practises emergency evacuation procedures to promote safety. Children are learning, through a wide selection of appropriate discussion and safety routines, to keep themselves healthy and safe.
