ABOUT THE INSPECTION

The purpose of this inspection is to assure government, parents and the public of the quality and standard of day care. When making judgements, inspectors have regard to how well the provider meets the National Standards for under Eights Day Care and Childminding. A list of these is attached. The report identifies strengths and areas for improvement.

This inspection report must be made available to all parents.

Information about the setting

Mrs Jeanette Horsfall is registered to provide Out of School care at Denton West End Primary School for a maximum of 24 children aged from four to eight years. The group at present have 70 children on the register, who attend at different times. There is a waiting list of children who wish too attend.

Mrs Horsfall is a qualified NNEB and holds a degree in Early Childhood Studies. There are four staff, of whom 50% are suitably qualified. The admissions policy gives priority to children attending the school. The group operates term time only from 08:00 to 09:00 and from 15:15 to 17:30. The group has exclusive use of a detached classroom at the rear of the school, opening out directly onto the school playing field.

How good is the Day Care?

West End Kids Club provides good care for children.

All staff give high priority to ensure children are safe both inside and outside the premises, undertaking regular risk assessments. Staff work well together and offer a wide range of experiences to the children in a caring and consistent approach. They attend training, appropriate to the ages of children in the club. The staff need to increase their awareness of child protection and procedures.

The staff provide play plans which offer children a wide variety of experiences, combining some projects with those run by the school. Staff organise an interesting programme of activities for children of all ages. A good range of indoor and outdoor play and learning equipment is available, suitable to all ages of children. All play and learning equipment are of good quality and support children's imagination and creativity. Equipment is changed regularly throughout the sessions, ensuring children's development and learning is stimulated and challenged. There was evidence of toys and books to promote equality of opportunities, race and culture in use on the day of inspection, but nothing which promoted images of disability. The make up of children attending the club reflects the social/cultural mix of the area the provision serves.

All children are encouraged and educated in healthy eating and good hygiene practices.

The staff have a good working partnership with parents. This was evidenced through the Ofsted parental questionnaires and the groups own end of year questionnaires. Parents are kept up to date and aware of all activities through daily verbal information sharing and the parent's notice board.

What has improved since the last inspection?

At the previous inspection the group were asked to gain written permission from parents for emergency medical treatment, devise a policy for sick children and record all risk assessments. All these have been completed ensuring all documentation meets the National Standards and providing for a safer environment for the children.

What is being done well?

- Children have access to a wide range of activities in a well set out, safe, secure and welcoming environment.
- Children are offered a good and varied selection of play which stimulates and develops their knowledge and confidence.
- The staff recognises the need to challenge children's imagination by offering a selection of stimulating equipment and projects.
- All children are encouraged and educated in healthy eating and good hygiene.
- Good clear policies and procedures are in place and understood by staff and parents.

What needs to be improved?

- toys and equipment which promote positive images of disability
- awareness of child protection and procedures.

Outcome of the inspection

CONDITIONS OF REGISTRATION

SUMMARY OF NATIONAL STANDARDS

STANDARD 1 - SUITABLE PERSON

Adults providing day care, looking after children or having unsupervised access to them are suitable to do so.

STANDARD 2 - ORGANISATION

The registered person meets required adult: child ratios, ensures that training and qualifications requirements are met and organises space and resources to meet the children's needs effectively.

STANDARD 3 - CARE, LEARNING AND PLAY

The registered person meets children's individual needs and promotes their welfare. They plan and provide activities and play opportunities to develop children's emotional, physical, social and intellectual capabilities.

STANDARD 4 - PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT

The premises are safe, secure and suitable for their purpose. They provide adequate space in an appropriate location, are welcoming to children and offer access to the necessary facilities for a range of activities which promote their development.

STANDARD 5 - EQUIPMENT

Furniture, equipment and toys are provided which are appropriate for their purpose and help to create an accessible and stimulating environment. They are of suitable design and condition, well maintained and conform to safety standards.

STANDARD 6 - SAFETY

The registered person takes positive steps to promote safety within the setting and on outings and ensures proper precautions are taken to prevent accidents.

STANDARD 7 - HEALTH

The registered person promotes the good health of children and takes positive steps to prevent the spread of infection and appropriate measures when they are ill.

STANDARD 8 - FOOD AND DRINK

Children are provided with regular drinks and food in adequate quantities for their needs. Food and drink is properly prepared, nutritious and complies with dietary and religious requirements.

STANDARD 9 - EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

The registered person and staff actively promote equality of opportunity and anti-discriminatory practice for all children.

STANDARD 10 - SPECIAL NEEDS (INCLUDING SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND DISABILITIES)

The registered person is aware that some children may have special needs and is

proactive in ensuring that appropriate action can be taken when such a child is identified or admitted to the provision. Steps are taken to promote the welfare and development of the child within the setting in partnership with the parents and other relevant parties.

STANDARD 11 - BEHAVIOUR

Adults caring for children in the provision are able to manage a wide range of children's behaviour in a way which promotes their welfare and development.

STANDARD 12 - WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH PARENTS AND CARERS

The registered person and staff work in partnership with parents and to meet the needs of the children, both individually and as a group. Information is shared.

STANDARD 13 - CHILD PROTECTION

The registered person complies with local child protection procedures approved by the Area Child Protection Committee and ensures that all adults working and looking after children in the provision are able to put the procedures into practice.

STANDARD 14 - DOCUMENTATION

Records, policies and procedures which are required for the efficient and safe management of the provision, or to promote the welfare, care and learning of children are maintained. Records about individual children are shared with the child's parent.
