Brief Description of the School:

Sexey's is a Voluntary Aided Church of England school, having been established in 1891. It is a maintained mixed comprehensive school. In recent years, the pupil roll has significantly increased through the introduction of day pupils to the school on a phased basis.

Boarding provision is in four houses, one house for year seven, two houses for years eight to ten, and one house for years eleven, twelve and thirteen. Three of these houses are located within the main school site and the fourth is a short walk away. Each house is divided into a boys and girls section with shared communal areas.

The school is located on the outskirts of the small town of Bruton.

SUMMARY

This is an overview of what the inspector found during the inspection.

Two inspectors from the Commission for Social Care Inspection (CSCI) undertook this inspection over three consecutive days. Prior to the inspection most of the boarders had completed a Children's Survey questionnaire. Parents had also been asked for their comments on the boarding arrangements and nine responses were received.

During this inspection the inspectors met with a number of boarders in small groups and some others were met informally. A guided tour of the school and boarding facilities were provided by small groups of boarders. Staff involved in the care of boarders were spoken with individually or in small groups and a wide range of records were examined. Inspectors were also able to observe or be involved in the daily routines of boarders.

The findings of this inspection were shared verbally with the Headmaster and his Deputy.

What the school does well:

The school continues to provide boarders with the right balance of discipline, genuine care and support. The outcome of these arrangements are happy, confident and socially competent young people. The senior management team are providing positive leadership to all staff involved in boarding care.

Pre inspection responses received from boarders and parents were complimentary about the boarding arrangements.

What has improved since the last inspection?

The school has addressed all of the issues raised at the previous inspection. Improvements have included enhanced privacy arrangements, creation of smaller sleeping areas, toilet and washing facilities have been refurbished which included heating and water supply improvements. These improvements are in addition to the schools planned refurbishment and maintenance programme.

What they could do better:

This inspection has highlighted some areas that require some additional work in order to fully comply with the National Minimum Standards. These improvements include the development of Risk Assessments for the boarding provision.

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Making a Positive Contribution

Achieving Economic Wellbeing

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Being Healthy

The intended outcomes for these standards are:

- Boarders' receive first aid and health care as necessary. (NMS 15)
- Boarders are adequately supervised and looked after when ill.(NMS 16)
- Boarders are supported in relation to any health or personal Problems.(NMS 17)
- Boarders receive good quality catering provision (NMS 24)
- Boarders have access to food and drinking water in addition to main meals.(NMS 25)
- Boarders are suitably accommodated when ill. (NMS 48)
- Boarders' clothing and bedding are adequately laundered. (NMS 49)

JUDGEMENT - we looked at outcomes for the following standard(s):

Quality in this outcome area is **good.** This judgement has been made using available evidence including a visit to this service.

Boarders health and well being is being effectively promoted and supported by a comprehensive range of policies and practices. The medical centre staff are valued and appreciated by the boarders.

EVIDENCE:

The PHSE has recently been extended to include citizenship. The modular PHSEC programme is well designed and comprehensive and offers sound basis for adult life preparation. This programme underpins the schools rules and ethos.

All confidential health care information is held securely at the medical centre by the registered nurses employed at the school. There is effective communication between the health centre and others involved in the care of the young people on a strictly need to know basis. The arrangements for young people to access a GP are clear and understood by the boarders. These arrangements also include the availability of a female GP. The school systematically requests all necessary consents.

The school has a rolling programme for the staff to undertake first aid training and an update of this is currently being undertaken.

The medical centre provides separate area for boarders who are ill. However boarders who continue to be unfit to attend school usually go home or return to guardians.

Boarders' questionnaires confirmed a general satisfaction with the schools catering arrangements. Some comments were also made by parents that were considered during this inspection. Menus are displayed in both the school and boarding houses. Inspectors sampled both lunch and tea and considered that a good choice of hot and cold foods were available. The school has now adopted the 'Healthy Eating Requirements'. Boarders' opinions are considered through house meetings and a food committee. Since the last inspection access to drinking water has been improved throughout the school and boarding houses. Each boarding house are provide with varied evening and weekend snacks and treats.

Each boarding house has in house laundry facilities that were commented upon by the boarders as being a good service.

Staying Safe

JUDGEMENT – we looked at outcomes for the following standard(s):

2,3,4,5,13,22,26,37,38,39,41 and 47

Quality in this outcome area is **good.** This judgement has been made using available evidence including a visit to this service.

The school's practical arrangements for managing child protection, bullying, complaints and behaviour management continue to be good, and are understood by the boarders. Advice on some minor adjustments to the current arrangements was provided.

EVIDENCE:

A high percentage of boarders confirmed through the pre inspection questionnaires that they were not being bullied (84.6%). Discussions with boarders during this inspection also confirmed that bullying was not a significant issue within this school. Prefects and staff were aware that bullying was likely to occur but were vigilant in their approach to any behaviours or incidents that could be considered to be bullying.

The school has a clear child protection policy in place that is made available to all staff and recent training for staff has maintained their awareness. Receipt of this training is documented for all staff. The Deputy Head is the liaison person for the school with other agencies.

It is worthy of note that 93% of the boarders considered that the school always or usually protected them.

Discipline within the boarding houses is considered by boarders to be fair and reasonable. All major punishments within the school are recorded appropriately and the Headmaster has overall responsibility. Minor punishments given in boarding houses are recorded in house and monitored by the deputy head as part of his monitoring and review of houses. The frequency of this monitoring was discussed.

Complaints are taken seriously and a clear policy and procedure operates. A written record is maintained and the most recent complaint was discussed as part of this inspection and records of this issue were finalised.

Prefects apply to the Headmaster in writing, and the selection process includes house staff views on their suitability. A trial period is used whereby incoming prefects receive training and support from staff and their outgoing peers.

The school are not involved in arranging guardians for boarders.

Fire risk assessments had been completed for each boarding house and the County Council will be progressing the required works identified. Regular fire drills are undertaken and recorded. However there was no consistent approach to the maintenance of these records. The school have agreed to address this. The wedging of fire doors was discussed and the deputy head will monitor these shared concerns.

The system for testing fire call points has recently changed and maintenance staff now undertakes this. The school recognised that the practice and recording needed to be standardised.

External contractors undertake fire equipment tests.

Privacy arrangement and practices observed were generally good and boarders confirmed this. The school acknowledge that there were two areas requiring some minor adjustments to further enhance the privacy arrangements.

The school has a clear understanding of the standards to be followed with regarding to the safe recruitment of staff. Sampling of individual staff records found that the school had systems in place to apply all o the checks required in National Minimum Standard 38.2. The sampled records were generally well maintained, and advice was given on some minor adjustment to the current arrangements.

All boarding houses have a good security door lock system that is operated by a key fob issued to each boarder. Additional security measures include signing in and out systems and CCTV surveillance.

Following this inspection the school are aware that they need to implement a systematic approach to environmental risk assessments.

Enjoying and Achieving

The intended outcomes for these standards are:

- Boarders have access to a range and choice of activities.(NMS 11)
- Boarders receive personal support from staff.(NMS 14)
- Boarders do not experience inappropriate discrimination.(NMS 18)

The Commission considers Standards 14 and 18 the key standards to be inspected.

JUDGEMENT – we looked at outcomes for the following standard(s):

14 and 18

Quality in this outcome area is **good.** This judgement has been made using available evidence including a visit to this service.

A range of appropriate people is available for boarders to consult. This inspection did not reveal any issues of inappropriate discrimination.

EVIDENCE:

Discussions with boarders and comments made in the pre inspection questionnaires demonstrated a wide range of people they felt able to approach. There are comprehensive useful contacts lists displayed prominently throughout the school and boarding houses. The school employs a counsellor who is usually accessed through the medical centre staff. Although some posters were displayed about this service the school acknowledged that this service should be mentioned in other key documents.

Equal opportunities at this school are actively promoted through their practices and policies.

Making a Positive Contribution

The intended outcomes for these standards are:

- Boarders are enabled to contribute to the operation of boarding in the school.(NMS 12)
- Boarders can maintain private contact with their parents and families.(NMS 19)
- New boarders are introduced to the school's procedures and operation, and are enabled to settle in.(NMS 21)

The Commission considers Standards 12 and 19 the key standards to be inspected.

JUDGEMENT – we looked at outcomes for the following standard(s):

12,19 and 36

Quality in this outcome area is **good.** This judgement has been made using available evidence including a visit to this service.

Boarders enjoy sound relationships with staff that include being consulted and listened to with regard to the operation of boarding within the school.

EVIDENCE:

House council and school council meetings take place and notes are circulated. Periodic surveys of boarders' views are carried out in conjunction with the Deputy Head's planned individual boarding house reviews. Boarders are of the opinion that their views are listened to and either acted upon or a reason given for no action.

The majority of boarders have mobile phones. Payphones are available in all boarding houses with a good range of contact numbers displayed by the phones. All boarders have email accounts through the school system. Parental comments received expressed general satisfaction with these arrangements.

There are very good relationships between staff and boarders. The inspectors observed boarders to be at ease in the presence of staff and a positive rapport pervaded in all areas of the school.

Achieving Economic Wellbeing

Quality in this outcome area is **good.** This judgement has been made using available evidence including a visit to this service.

The school have continued to invest in the boarding provision and have a development plan for further works.

EVIDENCE:

The general standard in all boarding houses is good. Boarders spoken with made comments about individual arrangements but were generally satisfied with the provision. The inspectors shared their views on their observations made during the inspection on the need to monitor and review arrangements in order to meet all individuals needs.

The school have an ongoing programme of refurbishment that includes mattress and furniture replacement.

The showering and toilet provision that has been refurbished since the last inspection provides a good range of facilities. The school were advised to consider the locks on doors in one boarding house when it is refurbished.

JUDGEMENT – we looked at outcomes for the following standard(s):

1,23,31 and 34

Quality in this outcome area is **good.** This judgement has been made using available evidence including a visit to this service.

The school benefits from clear leadership that is a partnership between senior management and the governors. There are sufficient staff deployed to the boarding arrangements of the school who are supported by clear policies and procedures.

EVIDENCE:

The school prospectus provides clear statements on the principles and practices of boarding at the school. This information is made available to parents and boarders.

The Head has made arrangements for all of the required records to be monitored on a regular basis. Discussion regarding the frequency of this monitoring took place.

There are clear staff rotas in place to support the young people in the boarding houses.

All staff involved in boarding have job descriptions. New boarding staff undertake a formalised induction programme and satisfactory completion is documented. There are similar arrangements for GAP students that also includes their attendance at BSA courses. The school agreed that arrangements for other assistants involved in boarding should follow the same process and all induction should be confirmed in writing.
