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Introduction

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under Sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of the registered early years provision. 'Early years provision' refers to provision regulated by Ofsted for children from birth to 31 August following their fifth birthday (the early years age group). The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and welfare, known as the *Early Years Foundation Stage*.

The provider must provide a copy of this report to all parents with children at the setting where reasonably practicable. The provider must provide a copy of the report to any other person who asks for one, but may charge a fee for this service (The Childcare (Inspection) Regulations 2008 regulations 9 and 10).

The setting also makes provision for children older than the early years age group which is registered on the voluntary and/or compulsory part(s) of the Childcare Register. This report does not include an evaluation of that provision, but a comment about compliance with the requirements of the Childcare Register is included in Annex B.

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Description of the setting

Wellies is privately owned and was registered in 2007. It operates from premises in Horncastle, Lincolnshire. The setting serves the local community and surrounding areas. There is a fully enclosed area available for outdoor play.

The setting opens five days a week all year round. Sessions are from 8am until 6pm for children aged from birth to eight years. Children are able to attend for a variety of sessions. The numbers and ages of the children attending are consistent with the staffing arrangements and the space available to meet the children's needs. The setting is registered to care for no more than 100 children at any one time. There are currently 68 children attending who are within the Early Years Foundation Stage. The setting is registered on the Early Years Register and on both the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. It supports children with special educational needs and/or disabilities and children who speak English as an additional language.

The setting employs 17 members of childcare staff. Of these, all hold appropriate early years qualifications. Two staff members hold a degree in early years. The setting receives support from the local authority.

The overall effectiveness of the early years provision

Overall the quality of the provision is good.

The management and staff team successfully promote most aspects of the Early Years Foundation Stage framework requirements within the suitable and inclusive environment. Children are making good progress in their learning and development. The management and staff team meet children's individual needs through the good quality provision they provide. Effective partnership with parents and good working partnerships with other providers and professionals promote an integrated, positive approach to children's care and learning. Good improvements have been made since the last inspection and the setting's appropriate system of self-evaluation is continuing to move the setting forward.

What steps need to be taken to improve provision further?

To further improve the early years provision the registered person should:

- provide further opportunities for children to begin to learn about the cultures and beliefs of other people
- develop further systems to ensure observation and assessments are consistent between all staff
- take necessary steps at all times to prevent the spread of infection and promote the good health of children.

The effectiveness of leadership and management of the early years provision

Children are happy and settled in the setting and they clearly relate well to the kind, caring and knowledgeable staff team. Effective practices and procedures are in place to safeguard children. For example, recruitment, vetting and induction procedures help to ensure the suitability of the staff and safeguarding policies are followed. The setting is securely maintained, with potential hazards identified and minimised through risk assessment procedures and CCTV in each area of the nursery. All staff are well qualified and they continue to develop their knowledge through their commitment to ongoing training and development, which is recorded on the staff matrix. Children are cared for in a warm, welcoming play space which is interesting and motivates children to learn and develop.

Leadership and management is strong. All records and documents are in place and are informative. Staff gain clear information from parents and carers, which enables children to make good progress from their specific starting points. It also motivates staff to value each child in line with their individual needs. Partnership working with parents and carers is good. Staff nurture purposeful relationships with parents and have thorough support systems in place, such as learning journey books, to which parents contribute. Information is continually exchanged and shared through the setting's clear communication channels but in a confidential and professional manner. Effective systems are in place to keep parents up-to-date with their children's progress and development, and parents are also actively encouraged to contribute to their children's records. Children also benefit because the setting liaises with external agencies or services. The staff team work with a range of other agencies and professionals in order to meet the individual needs of children and families as they are the link nursery with the children's centre. All staff have a good knowledge of the local area and how to access specific support, actively contributing to building good relationships. They take children on regular walks through Horncastle and local people know them well. All staff work as a strong team to ensure support and a smooth transition for all children.

The staff and management are committed to developing the service they provide and they work with Local Authority advisors to make improvements where necessary. Improvements have been made since the last inspection, which have enhanced care and learning experiences for children. The setting uses an effective system of self-evaluation in the form of action plans, which are constantly being updated to reflect current practice in the setting to ensure children benefit from improved practice in all areas.

The quality and standards of the early years provision and outcomes for children

The early years staff have a strong understanding of the learning and development requirements. They observe the children's individual learning and record their development in their learning journeys and diaries. Observations are recorded for all areas of learning and next steps are identified. Staff utilise the information they have obtained from concise observations to challenge and extend children's learning as they play. However, robust systems are not fully developed to ensure consistency amongst staff as to how they are recorded.

Children are cared for in a safe, secure and well-maintained environment. Good health & hygiene policies and procedures are in place to minimise the risk of crossinfection. However, these are not fully followed by some staff, in particular when ensuring children do not have dirty noses. Children benefit from a healthy diet, as a staff member prepares nutritious and well-balanced, home-cooked meals. Fresh drinking water is freely accessible to children from water dispensers and systems are in place to ensure each child's specific dietary requirements are met. Children have varied and stimulating opportunities to access a good range of play materials outdoors, which fully promotes their learning. Children's awareness of safety issues is also well promoted through discussions, activities and regular events. Children are also encouraged to take calculated risks with staff re-enforcing the possible dangers to help children to become aware of these and assess the situation for themselves. For example, when playing on the large equipment outside, staff support children while encouraging their play.

Children are making good progress in their learning and development. Planning, observation and assessment systems provide a range of adult-led and childinitiated play experiences for children. All children are making good progress in their literacy skills. Children are developing their speaking and listening skills well and are supported by their key workers. Children develop their emergent writing with a variety of resources and discuss what is meaningful. Children have access to a table set up for making marks which has notebooks, pads, paper and a range of media to encourage their writing skills. They interact enthusiastically, pointing to pictures as the key worker reads stories throughout the day. All children have good opportunities to develop physically. They energetically climb equipment, travel through tunnels and ride bikes. Babies are encouraged to make their first steps and they are supported well when taken for walks in the community. Children develop problem solving, numeracy and reasoning skills well. They become aware that numbers are sequential as they listen to number rhymes and count a variety of resources through their play. Children align puzzles, and measure ingredients when baking. Babies build with soft blocks and they are becoming increasingly confident to reach out for familiar toys. Themes and topics are chosen to develop children's knowledge and understanding of the world around them, including pets and insects and growing vegetables from seeds in the garden area. However, activities and resources chosen to celebrate children's diverse cultural backgrounds are limited. All children are encouraged to access all toys and resources regardless of their gender. Children have good opportunities to develop their creative skills. They know their colours, paint a variety of pictures and use a variety of natural materials to make collage pictures. Babies explore colour and paint through finger painting. All children have access to a sensory area in each room where they can relax and enjoy the experience. Children thoroughly enjoy using the computer and develop skills in all areas of learning while having fun.

Children's behaviour is good, with staff using appropriate management strategies. Staff act as good role models and are consistent in following the behaviour management policy and the solving problems and resolving conflicts poster displayed in each room. All of this encourages children to be motivated to learn and develop their skills.
