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## Introduction

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under Sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of the registered early years provision. 'Early years provision' refers to provision regulated by Ofsted for children from birth to 31 August following their fifth birthday (the early years age group). The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and welfare, known as the *Early Years Foundation Stage*.

The provider must provide a copy of this report to all parents with children at the setting where reasonably practicable. The provider must provide a copy of the report to any other person who asks for one, but may charge a fee for this service (The Childcare (Inspection) Regulations 2008 regulations 9 and 10).

Children only attend this setting before and/or after the school day and/or during the school holidays. The judgements in this report reflect the quality of early years provision offered to children during those periods.

The setting also makes provision for children older than the early years age group which is registered on the voluntary and/or compulsory part(s) of the Childcare Register. This report does not include an evaluation of that provision, but a comment about compliance with the requirements of the Childcare Register is included in Annex B.

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## **Description of the setting**

The Kingfisher Kids Club opened in 2004 and was registered again in 2006. It operates from its own building next to Millfield Primary School in the town of North Walsham, Norfolk. A maximum of 24 children may attend the club at any one time. It is open from 7.30am to 9am and from 3pm to 6.30pm, each week day during school terms and from 7.30am to 6.30pm in the school holidays. Children have access to a secure enclosed outdoor play area.

The setting is registered on the Early Years Register and on both the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. A maximum of 24 children may attend at any one time, all of whom may be on the Early Years Register, but none may be under four years of age. There are currently 68 children on roll, of whom five are within the Early Years Foundation Stage. The setting supports children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. Children attending mainly come from Millfield Primary School, although, families able to transport children to and from other schools are welcomed.

The club employs seven members of staff, of these, six hold relevant childcare qualifications. The setting receives support from the local authority.

## **The overall effectiveness of the early years provision**

Overall the quality of the provision is outstanding.

Highly effective partnerships between the staff, parents and others ensure individual children's needs are met and their safety assured. Leadership and management, including the capacity for sustained improvement, are outstanding. Evaluation of the setting and planning for continued improvement are excellent, with plans in place to improve children's access to free-flow play inside and outside. Each child is highly valued and respected as an individual, with their continuing learning and development needs ably supported to fully complement the progress they are making at school.

## **What steps need to be taken to improve provision further?**

To further improve the high quality early years provision the registered person should consider:

- improving children's access to free-flow play inside and outside.

## **The effectiveness of leadership and management of the early years provision**

All necessary steps are taken to safeguard children extremely well, at the same time allowing them to be independent, making choices and decisions for themselves. The staff have an excellent awareness of child protection issues and

all receive regular training on safeguarding. There are rigorous and thorough recruitment and vetting procedures, including the successful induction of new staff and ensuring that all staff have a valid Criminal Record Bureau check. Comprehensive policies and procedures are in place. All required written records, such as risk assessments, including those for any outings, are detailed and regularly reviewed. The premises are secure and risks minimised to fully maintain children's safety as they play.

The resources available to the children are extensive and support their play choices extremely well. The use of visual aids and labelling with words to show what resources are available is exceptional and ensures that all children are ably supported in making their own choices. The deployment of the staff is very effective and enables children to decide if they want to play indoors or outside. The environment and accommodation is conducive to supporting children's continued learning and development, it is organised very well and carefully looked after. Children clearly benefit and thrive as a result.

Actions taken to improve the club are well targeted to have a considerable impact in bringing about sustained improvement. Since the last inspection, the extension to the building has created more space for children. Previous recommendations have been implemented in an extremely positive way. For example, each child now has an allocated member of staff to support them on a daily basis. The environment reflects many attractively displayed examples of children's work. The manager is superbly successful in inspiring the staff team and they demonstrate high levels of practice. Reflective practice is evident, sessions are evaluated to ensure that they are meeting the needs of the children and others. The club promotes equality and diversity very effectively and as a result, all children are well integrated and their experiences are positive. Available resources, posters and children's displays reflect positive images of the wider world.

Excellent partnership working takes place to ensure that every child receives a high level of care and support. The club is highly committed to working in partnership with others and in establishing effective working relationships. As result, children's continued learning, development and welfare are well promoted. Parents and carers are extremely well informed about the club's policies and practices. Details obtained ensure that children's individual needs are fully met and respected. The club has a highly positive relationship with all parents and carers. They are fully encouraged to be involved in decision-making.

## **The quality and standards of the early years provision and outcomes for children**

All children show a strong sense of security and feeling of being safe within the club, ably supported by its excellent practices. Children safely use a range of tools and equipment within the setting, such as scissors. They have an extremely confident understanding of how they keep themselves safe. Information is shared with them to support this, for example, they benefit from visits from the military, police, the fire service and the St. John's Ambulance Service. The quality of staff interaction and exemplary organisation of the club, helps children gain an

exceptionally strong sense of well-being.

Children develop an excellent awareness of the importance of a healthy lifestyle. The provision of a healthy and nutritious breakfast and afternoon snacks support this. The superb visual aids ensure that all children are able to make choices about what they eat, with drinking water freely available throughout the sessions. The extensive range of outdoor equipment easily supports children's ongoing physical development. The club has a garden area where children are able to dig and plant. Plans are in place to grow potatoes and carrots, which when harvested, the children will try. All children are fully aware of the need to follow good personal hygiene routines.

All children have a strong sense of belonging and clearly know they make decisions about their play. They are extremely confident, settle well and develop excellent relationships with adults and their peers. Children play well independently and with their peers, showing excellent negotiation and co-operation skills. They show confidence when performing a non-contact Karate display for staff and their peers. All children are valued and engage in a wide range of activities and experiences, which include those that help them value diversity. Their behaviour is commendable.

Children are well supported in developing skills for the future. The excellent relationships with the adjoining school ensures each child's continuing learning needs are recognised and assessed. Each child's key person is fully aware of children's likes and dislikes, using their interests to ensure they have a fulfilling time at the club and their learning at school is complemented well. Regular observations ensure that children continue to make progress. Staff discuss any noted achievements with parents and the school to enable continuity of care and learning. Each child's record file is shared with parents, who are encouraged to contribute or make comments.

The support for children's development in information and communication technology skills is exceptionally good. For example, children are able to operate the hand held games for sport and dance or use the CD player. The club's encouragement for children's creative development is outstanding, with extensive materials and resources made available. The displays around the rooms show an imaginative flair. At the inspection, a child made a robot from boxes, tubes and plastic bottle tops, while another made a pirate's compass from cardboard. Staff encourage children and offer suggestions if needed, but generally they show a great wish to explore and decide for themselves.
