#### The quality and standards of the early years provision

#### The provision meets requirements

- Through discussion and documentation the supervisor and management team demonstrate the key person system is effective in helping children to feel safe, comfortable and secure.
- Strong links with the host school and external agencies supports children's individual needs and transition processes are successful.
- Children are provided with a broad range of good-guality resources, enabling them to make independent choices and supporting their learning and individual interests effectively both indoors and out.
- The provider has failed to meet the legal requirements of the Childcare Register to fully safeguard children in relation to security of the premises.

## Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are scheduled:

- at least once in every inspection cycle. The current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged as inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage; or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised for inspection where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children on roll when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children on roll, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states if the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

## Information about the setting

Class of Their Own @ Portslade Infants is one of 14 out-of-school clubs run by Class of Their Own Ltd. The club opened in 2006 and operates from Portslade Infants School in Portslade, near Brighton in East Sussex. The accommodation includes a large hall, a kitchen, toilet facilities and storage areas. There is an enclosed outside learning area. The club has links with the school on site.

The club is on the Early Years Register and on the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. At present there are 33 children on roll, aged from five to seven years. Children aged up to eleven years also attend the club. Opening times are from 3pm until 6pm each weekday, and from 8.30am until 5.30pm during some school holidays. The club is not open during the Christmas holiday.

Five members of staff are employed. The supervisor and one other member of the team hold National Vocational Qualifications at level 3 and all other members of staff except one hold a qualification at level 2. At the time of this inspection there were no children on roll in the early years age group.

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#### Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises that are usually their own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
