The quality and standards of the early years provision

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has made good improvements to her environment. She has reorganised her home, toys and equipment, which is now more child-friendly and gives children more free space to play.
- The childminder is committed to her role and has attended training and developed her documentation to help her improve her practice.
- The childminder has systems in place to ensure that children can benefit from regular fresh air and exercise by planning to regularly walk to school and nursery and visit the park, to help to promote their well-being and physical skills.
- There are systems in place to encourage parents to fill out 'all about me' form to provide information on their child. This is to ensure that the childminder receives good information on children's backgrounds, development and interests, so that she has a good starting point from which to base her care and education provision.
- The childminder has not yet cared for children under the new Early Years Foundation Stage requirements, therefore the impact of what she offers has not yet been put into practice.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are scheduled:

- at least once in every inspection cycle. The current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged as inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage; or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised for inspection where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children on roll when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children on roll, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states if the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

Inspection activities

- The inspector spoke to the childminder, checked her documentation, toured the premises and saw the equipment available.
- The inspector did not see children in the setting as the childminder does not have any children on roll.

Information about the setting

The childminder was registered in December 2008 on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She lives with her husband and children aged five and two years. There is a pet parrot on the premises. The home is

situated in a residential area close to the Quayside area of Newcastle-upon-Tyne and schools are within walking distance. The ground floor of the home and a bathroom on the first floor are used for childminding. The rear garden is also used for outdoor play.

There are currently no children attending the setting. The childminder is a member of the National Childminding Association.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

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Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises that are usually their own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
