The quality and standards of the early years provision

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a very sound understanding of how to meets the needs of the range of children because she understands how children learn and develop through play. She has a good range of toys, books, play materials and equipment to support children's learning and development in all areas and this includes provision for energetic outside play.
- There are appropriate systems in place to promote the learning, development and assessment requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. This includes establishing what children can do on entry, completing observations and assessments to inform children's activity plans and tracking their progress towards the early learning goals.
- The childminder has a good knowledge of how to support children's well-being. She has sufficient knowledge and understanding to support children to learn about keeping themselves safe and healthy. For example, she discussed the implementation of weekly menus and how children would influence these.
- The childminder understands her role and responsibility in regard to safeguarding children. This is further supported by her written policies and procedures and her knowledge of what to do if she had any concerns regarding a child in her care. All suitability checks are completed and updated to ensure children are protected.
- The childminder has a very sound understanding of the importance of working in partnership with parents and other agencies. She has formats in place for how she would achieve this to promote a cohesive approach.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children on roll when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children on roll, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she will deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector had a tour of the rooms used for childminding and the garden.
- The inspector looked at the policies documents and self-evaluation forms the childminder has available to use when caring for children.

Information about the setting

The childminder was registered in 2012 on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She lives with her husband and two children aged two and five years in a house in Stockton-on-Tees and uses the whole of the ground floor, bathroom on the first floor and the rear garden for childminding.

She attends a childminder group and the local children's centre. She visits the local shops and park on a regular basis. She collects children from the local schools and pre-schools. She has recently completed a BA Honours degree in Children and Early Childhood.

There are currently three children on roll, none are in the early years age group and all are school-age children who attend before and after school. She is open all year round from 7am to 7pm Monday to Friday except for family holidays.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

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and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
