The quality and standards of the early years provision

This provision is good

- Children make good progress in their learning and development. The childminder provides them with an interesting range of activities and experiences, which support them in all areas.
- The childminder promotes effective partnerships with parents, which enables her to meet children's individual needs successfully.
- The childminder enhances children's sense of belonging as she values and supports their home language well.
- The childminder provides a warm and safe environment, where the children can explore freely.

It is not yet outstanding because

Children are not always encouraged to be curious about their families, in order to learn that they have similarities and differences that connect them to, and distinguish them from others.

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Information about this inspection

Information about the setting

The childminder registered in 2013. She lives with her husband and three young children in Frome, Somerset. The childminder uses the ground floor for play activities. This consists of a lounge, conservatory and kitchen/diner. There is a first floor toilet, and a rear garden for outside play.

The childminder is registered on the Early Years Register and the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. There are currently five children on roll, of which three are in the early year's age range. The family have a dog.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

 extend opportunities for children to share photographs of their families, friends and favourite people to help children value themselves and learn about similarities and differences.

Inspection judgements

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend

Children enjoy a wide range of activities, which meet their individual needs and interests effectively. The childminder provides a warm and welcoming environment, where children can access resources freely and explore safely. The childminder shares warm interactions with the children and is skilful at extending children's play, to promote their learning in all areas. Young children enjoy using their senses to explore pasta, rice and oats. They share the bowls and cups, pouring the mixture from one to the other, feeling the textures with their hands. This supports children's understanding of the world and encourages them to explore and investigate.

Children play with the farm animals; the childminder engages them effectively in conversation as she talks about the animals they choose, and the sounds that the animals make. The childminder extends the children's interest with visits to a farm, where they see and learn about pigs, horses and cows. This widens children's understanding of the world, and supports them to acquire the skills they need to move onto the next stage of learning.

Babies share a warm and trusting relationship with the childminder. The childminder uses facial expressions effectively to respond to babies' sounds and gurgles. Babies watch the childminder with interest and smile in response to her interaction. This supports children's personal, social and emotional development. The childminder counts with the children in

everyday routines. In particular, she supports young children to develop good communication skills, incorporating words in their home language effectively. For example, she counts to three in both English and Spanish and uses 'bye' and 'ciao' with the children to say goodbye. Children enjoy listening to stories and sharing books, they particularly enjoy looking at a book of photographs of themselves enjoying activities with the childminder. However, the childminder does not yet encourage parents to contribute to these, to help children learn about similarities and differences in themselves and their families.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children

Children are very settled and happy in the childminder's care. The childminder provides regular cuddles and reassurance to young children, which helps them, feel emotionally secure and supports their physical health well. The childminder consistently praises the children for their achievements, which promotes their self-esteem and boosts their confidence. Children freely access a range of good quality resources, which promotes children's independence and freedom of choice. Children play well with one another; they share, take turns, and have 'special names' for their friends.

The childminder helps children to learn about the importance of a healthy lifestyle and following good hygiene routines. The childminder provides the children with a range of healthy snacks and meals, which they enjoy. She provides the children with daily opportunities for fresh air and exercise as they play in the garden, visit local play parks and attend toddler groups. This effectively supports children's physical development and helps them to develop their social skills as they meet with other children and adults.

The childminder teaches the children how to keep themselves safe as she talks to them about crossing the road and practises the fire drill. She provides clear explanations of what she expects from the children, such as; they must not stand on the chair and the reasons why. Consequently, they behave well.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision

The childminder has a good understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. She has completed thorough risk assessments on her home, the garden and for any outings that she takes with the children. The childminder has a secure knowledge and understanding of child protection issues, which includes recognising the signs or symptoms that would cause her concern. The childminder is clear on the reporting procedure if she did have a concern. She shares her safeguarding procedures with parents, which clearly states her responsibilities to protect children.

The childminder promotes positive partnerships with parents. She encourages daily exchange of information, including the use of a home link book to promote a two-way flow of communication. Parents are extremely happy with the provision and quality of care the

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childminder provides for their children. The childminder knows the children well and they are very happy to be with her. She has a clear understanding of the importance to exchange information with other providers when they share children's care and learning.

The childminder has a secure understanding of the learning and development requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. She makes regular observations of the children engaged in activities and using her good knowledge of how children learn through play to plan activities that support them in their learning. The childminder has completed an Ofsted self-evaluation form. She has used this to accurately identify her strengths and areas for development. She has recently attended a story sack course and is enthusiastic to attend other courses so that she can build on her knowledge further. This shows that the childminder has a good capacity to maintain continuous improvement.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

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and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
