The quality and standards of the early years provision

This provision is good

- The childminder has a good understanding of her role in children's development and learning. She provides relevant and interesting activities for the children that they enjoy and, with her support, benefit from.
- The childminder knows the children and their families very well. She provides a safe, caring, supportive environment.
- The childminder is an experienced, qualified childcarer who is well organised and fully understands her role and responsibilities with regard to keeping children safe and secure.
- Children make good progress in their development and learning taking into account their starting points and capabilities. Where gaps in development are noticed, action is taken to support the children and their families as they seek further advice.

It is not yet outstanding because

- There is scope to better support children's growing understanding of how to manage their emotions and feelings of frustration as they begin to learn the concepts of playing with other children, sharing and taking turns.
- There is scope to further strengthen the communication links with other settings children attend to better support the continuity of children's learning.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate

- The inspector observed children taking part in activities and discussed these with the childminder.
- The inspector looked at children's assessment records and the planning documentation.

The inspector checked evidence of the suitability and qualifications of the

 childminder, her assistant and her household. The latest self-evaluation and improvement plan was also seen.

The inspector took account of the views of parents and carers from the

 childminder's parent survey and from written comments in the children's assessment records.

Full report

Information about the setting

The childminder was registered in 2007 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She lives with her husband and two children aged nine and six years in a house in Rushden in East Northamptonshire. The childminder works with a part-time assistant. The whole of the ground floor of the childminder's house and the rear garden are used for childminding.

The childminder has 11 children on roll, including four in the early years age group. They attend for a variety of sessions. The childminder attends several toddler groups and activities at the local children's centre. She visits the parks and other nearby attractions on a regular basis. The childminder collects children from the local schools, nursery and preschools. The childminder operates all year round from approximately 8am to 5.30pm, Monday to Friday, except for bank holidays and family holidays.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- implement strategies to further support children's personal, social and emotional development, in particular, their ability to manage feelings and behaviour
- strengthen further the communication links with other providers of children's early years education to better support continuity of learning.

Inspection judgements

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend

The childminder has a good understanding of her role in children's development and learning. She teaches children the basic skills they will need to support their future learning. She provides relevant and interesting activities for them that they enjoy and so are keen to become involved in. For example, children engage in an activity putting animals into the ark two by two. When a child asks for more sheep, the childminder searches the box to provide them. Children make good progress in their development and learning, taking into account their starting points and capabilities.

The childminder observes children as they play and tracks their learning in line with expected developmental milestones. Where gaps in development are noticed, action is taken to support the children and their families as they seek further advice. There is, however, scope to better support. Occasionally, children are not sufficiently well supported in understanding and managing their emotions. This results in them becoming frustrated and venting their feelings inappropriately. Children benefit from playing in an environment that provides opportunities for conversation, discussion and singing. The childminder has a good understanding of how to develop children's communication and language skills. Books are readily accessible and feature prominently in the children's day. One in particular that includes favourite songs is popular and children laugh as the childminder talks about the antics of 'Incy, wincy spider'.

Children visit local groups with the childminder that enable them to socialise with other children of a similar age and to play with different toys. The childminder, with the help of her assistant, takes children on adventures to local parks and attractions. These visits develop children's understanding of the world. They get to know the local environment and observe animals in their natural habitat as well as experiencing an exciting and enjoyable day out. The childminder talks with parents each day and takes photographs of the children as they play to share with parents so they know what their children have been doing.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children

Children settle well with the childminder because she understands the importance of supporting the transition from home to her setting. Parents and children are invited to visit to ensure both parties are happy with the arrangements and the environment. There are caring relationships evident between the children and the childminder that make the children feel valued and secure. Children are treated respectfully by the childminder and thrive on encouragement and praise. As a result, children's behaviour is mostly managed consistently well.

Children are cared for in a clean and safe environment. Although children are taught to consider their own safety as they play, the childminder makes sure that everything children may come into contact with is risk assessed and made as safe as possible. Where this is out of the childminder's control, she informs parents and seeks their support to help to teach their children to avoid the problem area. Children's personal care skills develop as they learn about the importance of washing their hands at certain times. Children enjoy exploring on the equipment at the park and learn about the importance of fresh air and exercise when they are out and about with the childminder.

The childminder takes into account children's dietary needs and parental preferences when planning and preparing healthy snacks for the children. Parents provide a packed lunch for the children which the childminder serves. Children sit together at snack and meal times to make the time a social occasion so children learn how to behave at such times. Children's health and medical needs are known to the childminder and her assistant. They both hold a current paediatric first-aid certificate enabling them to deal with minor accidents and illnesses. The childminder is fully aware of the requirements for administering medication to children and for keeping accurate records.

provision

The childminder is an experienced, qualified childcarer who is well organised and fully understands her role and responsibilities with regard to keeping children safe and secure. She is fully aware of all issues relating to child protection and of her Local Safeguarding Children Board recording and referral requirements. The childminder's safeguarding policy includes procedures for the use of cameras and mobile phones in her home during childminding hours and what to do in the event of an allegation being made about herself, her assistant or another member of her household. There is also a procedure for the safe collection of children. The childminder makes parents aware that she, her husband and her assistant have undergone suitability checks with Ofsted so they are reassured about their children's safety. The childminder has all the documentation required for the safe and efficient management of her setting. Policies and procedures are shared with parents so they understand how the provision operates.

The childminder has a good understanding of the learning and development requirements and uses her experience of working in day nurseries to provide activities to support children's progress in all areas of learning. Progress is tracked and monitored regularly to make sure any gaps in learning receive additional attention. The childminder constantly reflects on her practice and along with her assistant, attends local training. She works closely with her assistant to ensure that practice is consistently good. In addition, she also seeks support from her local authority and other childminders to enable her to provide the best possible care and learning for the children placed with her. The childminder takes into account any comments from children, parents and others when reviewing and evaluating her practice.

The childminder has a good relationship with parents and keeps them informed about what activities children take part in during the day. The childminder understands the benefits and importance of working in partnership with others to promote continuity of care and learning, but these links are not always successfully maintained. This means that she does not always have a comprehensive understanding of children's experiences and achievements when they attend other settings.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
