The quality and standards of the early years provision

This provision is outstanding

- Children flourish at the nursery and are very happy and relaxed. They thoroughly enjoy a wide range of exciting activities that stimulate and motivate them. As a result, they make excellent progress in relation to their starting points.
- Children benefit hugely from the highly successful partnership between the staff and parents because their individual needs are well-known and superbly supported.
- The environment provides children with excellent opportunities to choose their play materials and follow their individual learning styles. Children benefit from using the outside area where they are able to explore role play and use their imaginations.
- Children feel extremely safe and secure in the nursery. This is as a result of very robust safeguarding policies and procedures.
- The quality of planning for all children is excellent; each child receives an exceedingly enjoyable, challenging experience across all areas of learning.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe

- The inspector observed activities in the indoor and the outdoor learning environment.

Information about the setting

YMCA Nursery Whale Island registered in 2006 and is one of seven nurseries run by the YMCA Fairthorne Group. It is situated on Whale Island, a Naval Base within Portsmouth and operates from a purpose-built building. The nursery is open each weekday from 7.30am to 6.00pm for 51 weeks of the year. All children have access to an enclosed outdoor play area. The nursery is registered on the Early Years Register and the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. There are currently 66 children in the early years age group on roll, and children are able to attend for a variety of sessions. The setting receives funding for early education for two-three-and four year olds. There are 14 members of staff employed to work with the children, all hold recognised childcare qualifications.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

review large group times to ensure the needs of the different ages of children are met to further enhance the provision.

Inspection judgements

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend

Children flourish at the nursery, they thoroughly enjoy their learning and achieve extremely well in relation to their starting points. Management and staff create a challenging and stimulating environment, where the atmosphere is incredibly positive and encouraging. Throughout the nursery, children are making excellent progress in all areas of development. They are confident and keen to join in activities and are developing warm relationships with each other and staff. Very effective systems are in place to ensure that children have many opportunities to consolidate or further their learning. For example, younger children are beginning to use tools such as paint brushes with confidence Older children are becoming confident in naming colours and shapes, and the oldest are progressing to writing their own name and understanding simple mathematical concepts. Staff demonstrate an extremely secure knowledge and understanding of how children learn. As a result, children are very enthused and develop a highly positive attitude to their learning and learn to work alongside their peers extremely well. The educational programmes ensure the children are offered extremely interesting and challenging experiences across the different areas of learning. The nursery is organised to provide a stimulating learning environment, with access to well-resourced areas that children can explore freely. Children develop excellent communication skills and chat happily both to one another and to adults. Staff support children extremely well, by offering praise and encouragement and they demonstrate an excellent understanding of children's individual

learning needs. Staff use high quality teaching methods to support and challenge children's learning. Children develop new skills and grow in confidence and rise to the challenge of trying something new. They are very active learners. Children's independence is promoted particularly well as they are developing skills, such as putting on their own coats and shoes, pouring their own drinks and helping to tidy up. All children enjoy many opportunities to choose, participate and become independent in their play.

Parents are highly encouraged to be involved with their children's learning at the nursery through excellent daily feedback and regular parent's meetings. The nursery has implemented the required progress check for two-year-old children very successfully and all related documentation is in place. As a result of the highly effective assessment and recording of children's progress, parents receive a very clear picture of where their children are in their learning. Parents are kept very well informed about the life of the nursery via the notice boards, newsletters, parent meetings and through daily discussions with staff. They state they have seen their children make exceptional progress while at the setting.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children

Children relish their time at the nursery. They are welcomed into a warm and friendly setting by staff who meet the children's welfare and learning needs with great success. Children are developing particularly warm relationships with each other and staff. An excellent key person system is in place which enables all children to be ready for the next stages in their learning. Children develop very strong emotional bonds and trusting relationships with their key person. This wonderful relationship helps children develop high levels of self-esteem and confidence. Staff make excellent use of resources. The indoor and outdoor play areas are extremely well organised to ensure children can take part in a wide variety of activities. Opportunities to develop physical skills are fostered very well. Children play in the outside areas of the nursery throughout the day. They have excellent opportunities to ride a range of wheeled toys and learn to climb, balance and catch. There is an excellent range of resources that allow children to build and role play in the outside area. Children of all ages particularly like going for walks to the shore or to look at the boats in the harbour.

The nursery provides an excellent variety of healthy and nutritious snacks and meals. The children benefit greatly from the carefully balanced menu offered. Children learn about good hygiene routines and from a very young age can independently take themselves off to wash their hands. They all know they must wash their hands after using the toilet, before eating and after messy play. Excellent systems are in place to inform staff of any health or dietary issues the children may have. Children behave extremely well, they are learning to share and take turns and play very well together. They are developing relationships with each other and interact extremely well together throughout the nursery. Children know what is expected of them and are very confident to make their own choices and decisions.

One of the nursery's strengths is how they handle children moving to the different age

groups within the nursery and their preparation for school. Excellent procedures are in place for a smooth move to ensure consistency of care and learning, and reassurance for each child. Parents are kept informed throughout the process to ensure they know what is happening. They are also invited to visit the next age group to get to know the staff before their child moves up. All staff are committed to making sure the changeover to the different age group is as smooth as possible for each child. Staff support the children extremely well to become independent and gain the skills needed to move successfully to the next stage in their learning. This high quality organisation ensures children are extremely well prepared for a smooth progression to school.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision

Parents and children are welcomed into an extremely warm and friendly nursery, by an excellent staff team who meet children's welfare and learning needs with great success. Very effective management structures are in place and communication between all levels of staff is excellent. The manager and staff team are extremely committed and highly dedicated to maintaining the highest levels of achievement for the children. Arrangements for safeguarding children are robust. Staff complete training in child protection and have an excellent understanding of safeguarding procedures. The registered provider and manager demonstrate an excellent understanding about rigorous and secure recruitment practice. Thorough induction and appraisal procedures are adhered to. This results in children being cared for by well qualified and suitably vetted individuals. The company and manager have high aspirations for quality, which is evident through ongoing improvement, in consultation with staff, parents and children. There are excellent systems in place to monitor and evaluate the setting, to ensure any strengths and areas for development are identified. For example, reviewing the large group times in each room is something that has been highlighted to enhance the provision further. All children are included and supported extremely well and the nursery promotes equality and diversity highly successfully. An extensive range of policies and procedures are in place and thorough risk assessments show how safety is prioritised in all areas both inside and outside. Staff monitor children extremely well and use clear explanations to help ensure that children learn to understand hazards.

A superb partnership between the nursery and parents ensures key information is shared between them. Staff keep parents of all the children informed about daily routines, the activities their children have taken part in and the food they have eaten. Parents express enormous confidence in the standard of care, communication and their children's preparation for the future. The nursery supports children with special educational needs and/or disabilities, and those learning English as an additional language extremely well. Partnerships with other settings the children attend are excellent. Staff liaise extremely well with the other providers of the Early Years Foundation Stage where children attend other settings. This results in a fully shared approach to children's care and learning.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
