## Monitoring for provision judged as inadequate

An Ofsted inspector, Helen Penticost, monitored your provision on 10/06/2014 following your inspection where the provision was judged to be inadequate.

## **Outcome of monitoring**

As a result of our inspection on 17/03/2014, we sent you a notice to improve. If you were set actions at the inspection, or as a result of our subsequent monitoring or investigations, these are included at the end of this letter unless we have already verified that they have been completed.

During the monitoring visit, the inspector discussed with you the steps you have taken to address the actions raised in the notice to improve. She observed interaction between staff and children throughout the nursery. The inspector also spoke to the manager, the deputy manager, individual members of staff and to a representative from the local authority. She looked at the planning and assessment records, accident records and action plans.

The inspector found that you have developed a comprehensive action plan to address the issues raised at your last inspection and have introduced systems to evaluate the quality of practice and the impact this has on outcomes for children. This has enabled you to accurately identify how to address the areas for improvement identified at your last inspection and to plan for ongoing improvement. You have welcomed support from your local authority.

Staff have greatly improved the learning environment and have introduced a new observation, assessment and planning system. You have recruited well-qualified and experienced staff to fully support the existing team. As a result, staff have improved children's learning and development opportunities through the delivery of an effective educational programme.





The new system for observation, assessment and planning enables staff to consider and plan for children's individual next steps in learning and their interests. Staff identify children's interests and enable them to explore these, which helps to ensure that children enjoy their play experiences and receive challenge in their learning. Staff are confident using the new systems to track children's starting points and progress, and are completing the required progress checks for two year olds. Staff now have a secure knowledge of what children have achieved. They use this to help identify and plan for children's next steps in their learning and to identify where additional support or challenge is needed. This has led to an improved programme of activities and experiences and, as a consequence, children are now making better progress.

The staffing team have re-organised all of the age group areas into learning zones and have also enabled children to access resources from the low-level storage. The staff have been developing their knowledge of providing an effective learning environment through visiting other settings. This enables them to see different ways of providing a challenging and stimulating environment in order to help children to take the lead in their own play and learning experiences.

The practitioner responsible for behaviour management has accessed training in order to increase his understanding of the role and how to influence and support staff in relation to children's behaviour. Management of children's behaviour across the nursery, and the staff's understanding of how to promote positive behaviour, have had a positive impact on the level of children's engagement in their learning. Staff act as positive role models and offer children praise and encouragement. Consequently, children begin to develop an awareness of their own behaviour and that of others, as well as developing good levels of self-esteem. You have revised your tea-time menu and children now have a healthy, well-balanced diet while at the nursery, which helps them to develop an awareness of the need to develop healthy lifestyles.

Having considered all the evidence, the inspector is of the opinion that the setting has taken prompt and effective action to address the points for improvement.

## **Next steps**

The next step will be a full inspection.
