Monitoring for provision judged as inadequate

An Ofsted inspector, Helen Penticost, monitored your provision on 03/07/2014 following your inspection where the provision was judged to be inadequate.

Outcome of monitoring

As a result of our inspection on 08/04/2014, we sent you a notice to improve. If you were set actions at the inspection, or as a result of our subsequent monitoring or investigations, these are included at the end of this letter unless we have already verified that they have been completed.

During the monitoring visit, the inspector discussed with you the steps you have taken to address the actions raised in the notice to improve. You have welcomed support from the local authority and your childminding advisor to enable you to make improvements. The inspector observed you working with the children and viewed your documentation.

The inspector found that you now have a clear understanding of your role in supervising children at all times. You ensure that they are in your sight and hearing at all times. This supports children's safety and well-being.

You have developed a clear system for the administration of medication. You request written parental permission prior to giving children medicines and you record when you give children any medication. You then inform parents that you have given medicine to their child. This helps to ensure that you meet children's individual needs.

The inspector found that you have put in place a system for observing, assessing and planning for children's individual learning needs and for sharing this information with parents. You also have a system in place in readiness for completing the written assessment of children's progress between the ages of two and three years of age. You know to highlight to parents the current stages of development for their child and also to highlight any potential learning gaps. Both these systems are in their infancy and therefore the full impact is not yet evident.





Having considered all the evidence, the inspector is of the opinion that the childminder has taken prompt and effective action to address the points for improvement.

Next steps

The next step will be a full inspection.
