# The quality and standards of the early years provision

# The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has reorganised the contents of her home and this means that there is insufficient space for the number of children that she may care for.
- The childminder does not maintain the required public liability insurance.
- The childminder understands her responsibility to promote children's learning and development and has training and experience to support her in assessment and planning.
- The childminder has suitable arrangements to promote children's health and to prepare them emotionally for their move to school.
- The childminder's home provides a suitably clean and safe environment for children. She does not use the garden which she recognises is unsuitable for younger children to play in.

# Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

# Information about the setting

The childminder registered in 2012. She lives with her husband and their two children in Chartham, Canterbury in Kent. Childminding takes place on the ground floor. There are toilet facilities on the ground floor. The childminder takes children to local parks for outdoor play.

The childminder is registered on Early Years Register and on both the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She currently has one child under eight years on roll. There were no children in the early years age range on roll at the time of this inspection.

The childminder is a qualified primary school teacher. The childminder walks or drives to the local school and pre-schools to take and collect children.

### What the setting needs to do to improve further

- ensure that there is sufficient indoor space to meet the needs of the number of children who may be cared for
- maintain valid public liability insurance.

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### Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

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and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
