The quality and standards of the early years provision

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her role and responsibility in regard to safeguarding children. This is further supported by her written policies and procedures and her knowledge of what to do if she had any concerns regarding a child in her care.
- The childminder has a suitable understanding of how to deliver the requirements of the Statutory framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage. She has attended relevant training.
- Formats are available to record observations and assessments of children's learning in a reflective journal. The childminder demonstrates that she is able to organise resources so they are easily accessible to help to children develop their independence.
- The premises are safe and secure with safety precautions, such as keeping doors secure and cleaning materials inaccessible to children, being in place. The childminder has a current paediatric first-aid certificate.
- The childminder has a sound knowledge of how to promote children's well-being. For example, she understands the importance of providing children with a healthy diet and ensuring they get fresh air and exercise daily. She has a good understanding of how to manage children's behaviour.
- The childminder is aware of the need to work in partnership with parents and others who are involved in the care and learning of the children, to ensure that children receive relevant support and continuity in their learning and development.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector looked at the policies and documents the childminder will use when caring for children.
- The inspector checked evidence of suitability of the childminder and all adults living in the house.

Information about the setting

The childminder was registered in 2007 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She lives with her husband and three children aged 18, 13 and 12 years in a Clayton Greater Manchester. The whole of the ground floor and the rear garden are used for childminding. The childminder attends a toddler group and activities at the local children's centre. She visits the shops and park on a regular basis. She collects children from the local schools and pre-schools. The childminder is currently caring for three children, one of whom is in the early years age range. On the day of the inspection there were no children present. The childminder operates all year round from 7am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, except bank holidays and family holidays.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
