The provision does not meet requirements

- The provider does not have robust vetting systems or documentation in place to make certain that staff are suitable to work with children.
- The manager has a sound knowledge and understanding of how to plan and deliver learning opportunities for individual children and to observe, assess and support their progress.
- There is a suitable range of resources in place to support children's learning needs.
- The manager understands the need to keep children safe and healthy and to manage their behaviour appropriately.
- The manager has a secure understanding of safeguarding practice and the procedures to follow if concerns are raised about a child to help keep them safe.
- The manager understands the importance of working with parents as partners in their child's care, learning and development.
- The manager has established a range of policies and procedure guidelines to enable children to play an active role in their care and well-being.
- The manager is aware of the importance of evaluating practice to drive improvement in the quality of the provision for children.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

Information about the setting

Little Blessing's Childcare and Education registered in 2014. It provides childcare on domestic premises and operates from the ground floor of the registered provider's home in the London Borough of Croydon. A garden is available for outdoor play. The provider lives on the premises with her two teenage children. Little Blessing's is registered on the Early Years Register and the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. At the time of the inspection there were no children on roll.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage the provider must:

implement robust vetting systems to ensure that all staff are suitable to work with children, and record information about staff's qualifications, identity checks and vetting processes completed.

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

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and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
