The quality and standards of the early years provision

The provision meets requirements

- Appropriate steps are taken to ensure children play in a safe and suitable environment, through a thorough process of risk assessment. The childminder holds public liability insurance and procedures are in place to take suitable action in the event of an emergency. The childminder holds a first-aid qualification, so she is able to provide assistance in the event of a minor accident.
- The childminder demonstrates a suitable understanding of safeguarding procedures and knows how to report concerns where necessary. She fully understands her responsibility to protect children's welfare and has attended child protection training. A range of policies to support the childminder's service are available to underpin practice and to share with parents.
- The childminder is well qualified in childcare. She demonstrates through discussion and documentation her clear understanding of how to plan for and assess individual children's learning needs. A good range of stimulating toys and resources are attractively displayed, especially those which support role play and imagination.
- Procedures are in place to ensure relevant information is shared between parents and the childminder, in order to meet children's needs and build positive relationships. These include gathering information about starting points, sharing a daily diary and holding progress meetings.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle – the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

Inspection activities

- The inspector held a discussion with the childminder about how she intends to deliver the educational programmes.
- The inspector looked at a selection of policies and documents that the childminder intends to use to support her practice.
- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability of the childminder and other adults living on the premises.

Information about the setting

The childminder was registered in 2011 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. She lives with her partner and three children aged 14, 12 and two years in Bretton, Peterborough. The whole ground floor of the house and the rear garden are used for childminding. The family has two pet dogs. The childminder visits the shops and park on a regular basis. She takes and collects children from the local schools. The childminder operates all year round from 7am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, except Bank Holidays and family holidays. She is a member of Professional Association for Childcare and Early Years.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

The Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (Ofsted) regulates and inspects to achieve excellence in the care of children and young people, and in education and skills for learners of all ages. It regulates and inspects childcare and children's social care, and inspects the Children and Family Court Advisory Support Service (Cafcass), schools, colleges, initial teacher training, work-based learning and skills training, adult and community learning, and education and training in prisons and other secure establishments. It assesses council children's services, and inspects services for looked after children, safeguarding and child protection.

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
