## The quality and standards of the early years provision

### The provision meets requirements

- Leadership and management is effective as the owner demonstrates she understands and meets the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. Suitable steps are in place to assess the risks which children may come into contact with. All the required documents and procedures to ensure the efficient running of the service are maintained and available for inspection.
- The owner/manager and staff have a suitably sound knowledge of child protection procedures. They understand their responsibility to protect the welfare of the children in their care. Staff are familiar with potential signs of abuse. As a result, they understand who to contact to protect children they suspect may be being abused.
- The provider demonstrates she has capacity to improve and further develop the club. She has taken appropriate steps to address the recommendations made at the last inspection. As a result, the way children's learning is planned for is now improved, and children are now involved with the growing and care of school plants during holiday periods.
- The staff demonstrate a commitment to working with parents, school staff and other services to meet children's specific health and learning needs. Staff seek information from school staff so they can plan activities to complement the learning children receive while in school.
- A large selection of play equipment is stored so children can view what is available. As a result, children enjoy play experiences that span all seven areas of learning. The older children attending the club freely seek additional resources to play with. This allows the children to follow their own ideas and be independent and active learners.
- The provider understands how to promote children's well-being. She demonstrates that she provides children with healthy snacks and encourages them to exercise daily. Staff also understand how to positively manage children's behaviour.

## **Information about this inspection**

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle – the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

## **Inspection activities**

- Prior to the inspection, the inspector viewed the information about the provider and took into consideration any additional information held by Ofsted. During the inspection, he spoke informally with some of the children and was introduced to some of the parents by the owner/manager.
- The inspector checked the arrangements for first-aid trained staff and their deployment to enable them to respond to emergencies quickly.
- The inspector looked at the provider's records, policies and procedures including those detailing the steps taken in the event of a child having an accident, and verified staff qualifications and suitability.
- The inspector held discussions with the owner/manager and the deputy manager.
- The inspector held an informal meeting with the deputy manager. He used discussion about the children's planning and assessment records to explore the

deputy manager's understanding of the way children's learning is supported through different activities and play.

## Full report

### Information about the setting

Holy Trinity Out of School Club was registered in 2003 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. It is situated in Southport, Merseyside and is managed by an individual. It operates from basement rooms in Holy Trinity Primary School. The main hall, two classrooms and the computer suite on the ground floor are sometimes available for use. There are enclosed areas for children's outdoor play. The club employs four members of childcare staff and there is also a regular volunteer, all of whom hold appropriate early years qualifications. These include one member of staff who has a qualification at level 5 and three who have a qualification at level 3. The remaining member of the team has a qualification at level 2. The club opens Monday to Friday, all year round, with the exception of bank holidays. Hours of opening are from 7.30am until 8.50am and 3.15pm to 6pm during term time. During school holidays the club operates from 8am until 6pm. Children attend for a variety of sessions. There are currently 24 children on roll, of whom one is within the early years age group. At the time of the inspection, no early years children were present.

## Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

The Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (Ofsted) regulates and inspects to achieve excellence in the care of children and young people, and in education and skills for learners of all ages. It regulates and inspects childcare and children's social care, and inspects the Children and Family Court Advisory Support Service (Cafcass), schools, colleges, initial teacher training, work-based learning and skills training, adult and community learning, and education and training in prisons and other secure establishments.
