# The quality and standards of the early years provision

### The provision meets requirements

- Each child is treated as an individual and each have their own special person whom they have secure attachments to.
- Each staff member has extensive information to meet the needs of the individual child and they plan accordingly to ensure those needs are met.
- The high staff ratios support children's ongoing safety and well-being.
- Staff have regular meetings with the manager and this enables them to identify future training needs, in order to promote continuous improvement to their practice.
- Staff have formed positive relationships with parents and staff at the school children attend, in order to work collaboratively to meet children's individual needs.

#### Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the voluntary and compulsory parts of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

## **Full report**

#### Information about the setting

KIDS Extended Clubs registered in 2009 and operates from St Francis School in Fareham. The club caters for children and young people with multiple learning difficulties and/or disabilities. It is managed by KIDS which is a charitable organisation. It is registered on the Early Years Register and on both the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. There are no children in the early years age group currently attending. Children up to the age of 19 years may attend the provision, which offers a Saturday club twice a month during term time and after school care during school term time. The Saturday club operates from 1.30pm until 4.30pm and after school care is from 3pm until 6pm, Monday to Friday. The premises are very accessible and the children's base room is a classroom in the school. Children also have access to the soft play equipment, home economics room, a quiet room and hall within the school premises. There is access to extensive grounds for outdoor play. Five practitioners are employed to work at the after school club, of whom, four have suitable qualifications. Additional practitioners are employed to work at the Saturday Club dependant on numbers of children and young people expected.

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#### Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
