The quality and standards of the early years provision

This provision is good

- Children are happy and comfortable in the out-of-school club. A good range of resources are readily available and children can make choices freely and independently.
- Warm, sensitive relationships support children giving them the confidence to explore the resources and take an active part in group activities.
- Partnerships with parents are promoted well, enabling parents to be well informed about the activities their children are engaged in.
- Staff implement a strong atmosphere of positive behaviour supporting children to develop good skills for self-control.
- Children are effectively safeguarded through successfully implemented policies and procedures and effective staff deployment.

It is not yet outstanding because

There is room to strengthen the level of children's personal independence, for example, by involving children in playing a greater role in the preparation of snacks and meals.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate

- The inspector took account of the views of parents spoken to on the day of inspection.

Full report

Information about the setting

Castle Care Club at Ednall Lane was registered in 2004 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. The setting is privately owned and managed and is part of a chain of settings run by the same providers. It operates from four rooms in the Baptist Church Hall in the town of Bromsgrove. The setting serves the local area and has strong links with local schools. The out of school club employs five members of childcare staff. Of these, three members of staff hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3 and two hold playwork qualifications at level 3. The out-of-school club opens Monday to Friday from 3pm until 6pm, during school term time. Children attend for a variety of sessions. There are currently 56 children attending, three of whom are in the early years age group. The out of school club supports children with special educational needs and/or disabilities.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

strengthen the children's level of personal independence, for example, by involving them more in the preparation of snacks and meals.

Inspection judgements

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend

Staff clearly have a secure knowledge of the children's different learning styles. This enables them to plan activities and experiences that follow children's interests. The flexible planning ensures all children are included and can freely choose activities and resources. Staff provide a stimulating environment with games and activities that children participate in and thoroughly enjoy. All toys and resources provided are of good quality and appropriate for the wide age range of children who attend the out-of-school club.

Children arrive and quickly settle to the activities provided. Once all the children have arrived they are offered tea. Staff sit with the children engaging them in conversations about their day at school and children eagerly share their news. Staff provide a good range of activities and children can ask for other resources. For example, they play a role play game with the dolls and buggies, and staff encourage their imaginative skills by allowing them to extend the game with other resources. Staff skilfully engage children in a large group activity. They introduce the children to a game with the parachute; the children clearly know the rules and are able to follow the instructions well. Children freely choose new resources from the store cupboard to build a track, and then use the stilts with skill to manoeuvre up and down the track. Staff's secure knowledge of the children ensures they plan activities and experiences that follow the children's interests. Children are fully engaged with the activities and play purposefully. As a result, they are

independent, active learners who organise play for themselves.

Parents are encouraged to share what they know about their children through information collected at admission. The staff team ensure that parents are kept in touch with the activities and experiences their children have at the out-of-school club. Parents are encouraged to speak to staff at any time, keeping them up to date with the children's progress.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children

Children's confidence is positively promoted in the out-of-school club. Children build warm and trusting relationships with the staff and clearly feel very settled, as they eagerly join in conversations with staff. Good systems are in place for behaviour management. Staff are consistent and give children lots of praise and encouragement, supporting them to develop good skills for self-control. Children are well behaved and participate in activities eagerly, in a safe and secure environment. Staff use information gathered from parents to support them to get to know the children well. This ensures they are able to address any issues quickly and sensitively. Children clearly feel safe at the out-of-school club, as they move around the play space confidently and decide what to play with. Children are supported to take responsibility for their own safety. For example, children are reminded of the club rules and show they understand about containing boisterous games.

Staff understand the importance of good hygiene practices and they encourage children to use appropriate hand-washing routines before and after all meals and after toileting. Children take part in group activities supporting them to learn good sharing and turn taking skills and supporting them to understand how to work well together. Staff support children to eat a healthy and balanced diet that meets their individual dietary needs. Children are able to choose what they will eat. However, their personal independence is not always fully supported as they are not offered the opportunity to take part in preparing the snacks and meals.

Children's physical well-being is promoted and they have opportunities to take part in large physical activities in the hall. As a result, they are learning the value of exercise and developing their large physical skills. Children with special needs and/or disabilities are well supported and staff ensure they are fully included in all activities. The staff offer an extra collection service, which allows children to take part in a variety of other activities before arriving at the club.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision

The management ensure that the staff team have a knowledge of the Early Years Foundation Stage, supporting them to meet the individual needs of the small number of younger children attending. Children are effectively safeguarded through good levels of supervision and careful use of regular risk assessments. The staff are very well supported by the senior management team to be fully aware of their responsibilities and the procedures they must follow in relation to child protection concerns. The well-written policies and procedures provide all staff with the information for recording and reporting any concerns they may have. Visitors to the out-of-school club are asked to provide identification and complete the visitor's record. Robust recruitment and selection procedures are in place and ongoing checks are completed for all staff to ensure they are and remain suitable to work with the children. A comprehensive self-evaluation document has been completed, which clearly and accurately identifies the club's strengths and any areas for improvement.

This is a small, well-motivated team who work very well together sharing ideas and skills. This effectively supports them to plan and provide a stimulating environment for all children who attend the out-of-school club. The senior management team provide more formal support for the staff through regular supervision sessions.

The staff team actively welcome parents, and arrangements are in place to share information with parents about what activities their children have taken part in at each session. For example, staff talk to parents at collection times and encourage them to exchange information about their child. Parents are happy and make positive comments about the out-of-school club when spoken to at inspection. They feel the staff team are friendly and flexible and that their children are happy and safe here and enjoy the games and activities.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
