Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder offers a welcoming, child-friendly, inclusive environment. She organises her home effectively to create well-resourced play areas where children can help themselves to resources with ease.
- The childminder is skilled at creating safe, sensory resources for treasure baskets. This allows young children to explore, investigate and discover a range of materials using their mouths and hands.
- Children take part in a wide variety of interesting activities and experiences. They make good progress in their development in relation to their starting points and capabilities.
- The childminder provides good support for children and families who speak English as an additional language. The childminder uses resources that reflect their home languages, which gives children a sense of belonging.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to protect children. She knows what to do if she has concerns about a child. This ensures children are safe.

It is not yet outstanding because:

The childminder does not consistently seek input from parents relating to children's learning and interests at home. This does not fully promote a joint approach to assessment and learning. **Inspection report:** 5 February 2015 **2** of **5**

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

strengthen partnerships with parents by obtaining ongoing information about children's learning and interests at home to foster a joint approach to assessment and learning.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

The childminder completes regular observations of the children's progress and development and identifies next steps for their learning. This enables her to provide an exciting range of activities that capture children's interests and hold their attention. For example, children enjoy using a jumbo musical box and moving their bodies to favourite songs. The childminder is skilled in encouraging children's communication. She takes the time to listen and respond to younger children's emerging language. This encourages them to become skilful communicators. The childminder teaches children to value people and communities by using books and posters that reflect positive images of diversity. She helps them learn about a range of cultural festivals throughout the year, such as Chinese New Year, Easter and Diwali. The childminder establishes positive relationships with parents from the beginning of the contract in order to obtain children's starting points. However, she does not always ask parents for information about children's interests and learning at home. Therefore, they are not fully involved in the assessment process.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

Children have developed good relationships with the childminder, who is warm, responsive, and attentive to their needs. She plans the day around their familiar home routines, such as nap times. This provides consistency and supports children's physical and emotional well-being effectively. Children respond well to the childminder's calm and gentle manner and their behaviour is good. The childminder prepares healthy, balanced, home-cooked meals. As a result, children are developing a positive attitude to a healthy lifestyle. The childminder organises her home well so there is ample space and equipment to support younger children who are developing their crawling and walking skills. This promotes children's physical development successfully.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

The childminder shows commitment to developing and improving her provision. She has a positive attitude to training and, since her last inspection, she has completed a number of courses. These include courses on health-related behaviour changes, physical activity, nutritional guidelines and obesity. She has used what she has learnt to improve children's health. The childminder gains the views of parents and children via questionnaires. These contain positive comments from parents and children such as, 'I love coming here because I always have lots of fun. For instance, I learn lots of new things about skate boarding.' The childminder has made various improvements to her practice since the last inspection. For example, she has reorganised resources to make them more accessible to children, allowing them to make independent choices. This demonstrates her strong commitment to continuous improvement.
