#### This provision is outstanding

- The club has robust links with the host school. This ensures children's care and learning compliments that delivered at school. Therefore, children settle quickly and are ready to learn.
- Staff plan ambitious activities that engage children in challenging topics to capture their imagination. As a result, all children make rapid progress.
- The manager works with uncompromising drive and motivation to lead staff towards excellence. A targeted and rigorous approach to self-evaluation ensures that the club is consistently improving outcomes for children.
- Partnerships with parents are outstanding. Extremely effective practices promote open communication, supporting excellent joined-up working between the club and home.
- Very high priority is given to safeguarding and protecting children. Staff continually assess and monitor the safety of the environment both indoors and outside. This promotes children's safety and well-being very well.

### What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

build on the strong training programme currently available by providing even more opportunities for staff to share knowledge and skills, to further enhance the outstanding service.

## **Inspection findings**

# How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is outstanding

Children are highly motivated and engaged in their play because the planned activities provide challenges. Staff have expert knowledge and skilfully adapt their practice to meet children's differing needs and abilities, ensuring that they all make rapid progress in their learning and development. For example, when playing a ball game, staff challenge older children further, while simplifying the activity for younger children. This ensure all participants benefit extensively from the group activity. Planning is streamlined with the programme of activities delivered at the host school. This ensure that children's planned learning opportunities are seamless and complement those experienced at school, promoting the best possible development towards the next stage in learning.

# The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is outstanding

Children thrive in a warm and welcoming club. Staff give high regard to individual needs and demonstrate attentive care to each child. Children form extremely secure attachments with staff, enabling them to play with confidence. Positive relationships are further extended through the friendships children make with each other and when children of various ages play respectfully together. Children's behaviour is excellent. This is because they are led by very skilful staff who deliver clear requests about their expectations and are exceptional role models. Children's health and well-being is fostered very effectively as children have daily access to a large and well-equipped outdoor play space. As a result, children experience physical exercise and fresh air every day. Furthermore, the management access support through a local authority health scheme to promote healthy lifestyles. Children learn about dental hygiene and eating habits to nurture a positive attitude to personal health.

# The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is outstanding

The club is effectively managed by a strong leadership team. Staff enjoy consistent support from the management, through regular supervision meetings. This enables the management to rigorously asses the quality of practice and coach staff at regular intervals. Additionally, staff attend regular meetings to share knowledge and skills with each other, improving the already excellent quality of teaching. However, there is room to enhance staff development by providing more peer coaching and mentoring opportunities between staff. All staff are qualified and trained in first-aid and safeguarding. Staff have a very secure understanding of their responsibility to protect children and safeguarding practices are well embedded. Effective partnerships with parents are prioritised by both management and staff. Families comment the quality of care and attention provided at the club is exceptional. The management and staff collectively strive to provide the best opportunities for children. Overall, this is a strong team delivering an outstanding service.
