Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates a very good understanding of the learning and development requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. She is able to explain how she uses her knowledge to provide a developmentally appropriate learning environment for all children.
- The childminder knows how to safeguard children effectively and can explain what she would do if she had concerns about a child's welfare. She is able to give examples of how she ensures that children's emotional needs are met as they start in the setting, so that they settle quickly and feel secure.
- The childminder can explain how she helps children to understand about healthy lifestyles, healthy eating and the importance of regular fresh air and exercise.
- The childminder has very good knowledge and understanding of how to meet the needs of all children, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities by working in partnership with parents and professionals.
- The childminder can explain how she uses observations and assessments to plan activities and experiences, which reflect children's interests and next steps in learning.
- The childminder has a comprehensive set of policies and procedures in place to meet health and safety requirements and risk assessments are used to reduce hazards. Consequently, this ensures that children are safe in the setting and on outings.
- The childminder is able to give examples of how she works in partnership with parents. She understands the importance of collecting information from parents about children's care, learning and development to ensure that their individual needs are met.
- The childminder is committed to undertaking training to improve the quality of her practice as part of development planning.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
