This inspection

This home was judged good at the last full inspection. At this interim inspection Ofsted judge that it has **declined in effectiveness**.

There were three recommendations made following the last inspection. Two of these had been addressed. The first related to gaps in staff's employment histories; these have now been satisfactorily explored. The second related to ensuring staff received supervision at the stated frequency; staff are now receiving supervision at an appropriate frequency. The third recommendation related to ensuring that information from placing social workers is gained in a timely way. While there has been some progress in meeting this, some information remains outstanding and this means that the internal care planning, for some young people, may not to be up to date.

Staff have not, in every case, followed documented risk assessments relating to young people's health needs. Additionally, they have not always informed parents that their child is unwell in a timely way. At the time of the inspection these shortfalls had not been picked up through the monitoring processes and therefore any concerns about specific incidents had not been identified or investigated. The recording made when young people are unwell are insufficient. For example, they do not contain enough detail for the reader to gain a comprehensive view about what occurred or what decisions were made about whether or not to seek medical advice.

Young people enjoy a range of planned activities, of their choosing. This helps to stimulate them, provide them with exercise and allow them to have fun. For example, the have adopted animals at the local zoo and follow their progress with interest, they go swimming and take part in many other activities outside and inside the home.

Young people's wishes and feelings are seen as important and are acted upon. These are gained through a range of means that include monthly young people's meetings, the use of a suggestion box and through an advocate who visits to meet

with the young people on a monthly basis. The home is also introducing a self-advocacy tool that young people will be able to use to express their views. A positive development is a 'communication tool box' which has a range of resources to help young people to express their wishes and feelings. Young people's attendance at reviews is well supported so that they can feed their wishes and feelings into the planning for them. Useful pictorial and widget booklets have been developed that ensure they are well informed about what the home can provide them and what to expect from their stays in the home.

Young people make progress in many areas of their lives. For example, there have been improvements, for some, in their vocabulary and sentence structure, and for others, an increase in their levels of independence, through the use of equipment supplied by the home. This impacts positively on their self-esteem and confidence.

Young people are happy to have stays in the home; they are clearly at ease with the staff and enjoy their time with them. They build and maintain friendships with other young people who stay there and this helps them to make and maintain friendships and develop their social skills.

Young people learn about how to keep themselves safe. For example, staff work with them to increase their understanding about who is and who may not be a safe person and support them in understanding about the fire evacuation procedure so they understand how to evacuate the building in an emergency.

Information about this children's home

The home is run by a local authority and provides care and accommodation for up to five children with physical disabilities, learning disabilities and sensory impairment. Three children can be accommodated under short break arrangements, one young person can be accommodated as a permanent placement and one young person can be accommodated under a shared care arrangement.

- ensure there are clear and effective procedures for monitoring and controlling the activities of the home. (NMS 21.1)

Information about this inspection
