## Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision is inadequate

- Maintenance and storage of staff records is not fully robust, to ensure the safe and efficient management of the setting. As a result, required information about details of Disclosure and Barring Services checks and staff qualifications is not available to view at inspection, so suitability cannot easily be verified.
- There is no programme in place for the supervision of staff, to actively monitor their work, create a culture of mutual support and set targets for professional development.
- There are unsatisfactory procedures in place for checking the ongoing suitability of staff. This compromises children's well-being.
- Monitoring of staff's practice is not yet successful in focusing strongly enough on the quality of teaching. Therefore, teaching is often variable and does not ensure a consistently rich learning experience for all children.
- The committee and manager have not ensured that Ofsted is notified of changes to the committee as part of their safeguarding measures.
- Self-evaluation is not effective enough. The views of staff, children and parents are not fully considered when making decisions about what needs to be improved.

#### It has the following strengths

- Children enjoy their time at the setting and play happily with each other and staff.
- Staff have developed positive relationships with parents and strong links with the local school, to support children in their next stage in learning. This means there is a shared approach to children's care and learning.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage the provider must:

- ensure that records are available for inspection, with particular regard to information about staff qualifications and the identity checks and vetting processes that have been completed on all staff
- implement appropriate and effective arrangements for the supervision of staff; to monitor their work and create a culture of mutual support, coaching and training, in order to develop staff practices and promote the best interests of children
- develop robust procedures for checking the ongoing suitability of all staff by ensuring staff are aware that they must disclose issues, such as, convictions, cautions, court orders, reprimands and warnings that may affect their suitability to work with children
- monitor the quality of teaching effectively and ensure that staff receive the support, coaching and training they need in order to deliver high quality teaching across the provision, so that all children make consistently good progress.

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

develop effective procedures for self-evaluation, by seeking the views of staff, children and parents to identify strengths and targets for improvement.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability and qualifications of staff working with the children, and the manager's procedures for self-evaluation.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector observed activities and the quality of teaching.
- The inspector looked at children's assessment records and the planning documentation.
- The inspector spoke to members of staff, parents and children at appropriate times during the inspection and held meetings with the manager.
- The inspector had a tour of the pre-school.

### **Inspection findings**

# How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is inadequate

The pre-school offers an appropriate learning environment. Children have access to a range of activities that generally support their development across the areas of learning. Most staff employed by the pre-school are qualified to level 3 in childcare. However, they do not always use this knowledge to good effect. For example, they do not ensure planned activities and experiences match all children's needs and challenge them sufficiently. Furthermore, staff miss opportunities to extend children's learning further, by asking questions that encourage them to think more creatively and critically about their answers. In addition, staff who have attended training on the care and education of two year olds have not yet cascaded their knowledge to all staff, in order to make a positive impact. Staff undertake appropriate observations to establish children's achievements and use this information to track their progress.

# The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is inadequate

Management has not notified Ofsted of changes in committee members. Although the committee members do not work directly with the children, who are not therefore, put unduly at risk, this is a breach of the welfare requirements. Children are independent and are beginning to acquire the skills and abilities needed in preparation for their future learning and school. They independently select from the healthy choices of snack, which also gives children some control over this part of their day. Staff role model good health and hygiene practices as they encourage children to wipe their noses and wash their hands to help prevent the spread of infection. Children are beginning to show an awareness of how to behave. This is because staff discuss unwanted behaviours with the children. Therefore, children gain a basic awareness of what staff expect from them. Children benefit from fresh air, exercise and develop their physical skills as they attend the weekly forest-school activity. Parents commented they are happy with the care provided and that their children 'love the opportunity to experience the outside classroom'.

# The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is inadequate

The leadership and management of the pre-school is inadequate. Management do not have a robust understanding of the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. Records to verify all staff qualifications and identity and vetting checks are not available. Furthermore, staff have not been informed that they are expected to disclose anything that might affect their ongoing suitability to work with children. In contrast, all staff are clear about their duties and the procedures to follow should they have a concern about a child in their care. Staff are not supported in developing their practice. They do not receive regular supervisions. In addition, the quality of teaching and learning is not effectively monitored. This impacts negatively upon children's learning and progress. Furthermore, self-evaluation is in the early stages and does not yet take into account the views of all those associated with the pre-school. As a result, the pre-school has a weak capacity to maintain or improve the quality of provision for children.

Longdendale Pre-School was registered in 2001. The pre-school employs four members of childcare staff. Of these, three hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3. The pre-school opens from Monday to Friday, term time only. Sessions are from 9am until 12noon. The pre-school provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the Early Years Foundation Stage.

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
