Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff plan effectively to provide a range of interesting and enjoyable activities for individual children that promote their next stages in learning.
- Staff use a variety of effective ways to communicate with all children. This means that children develop good communication skills.
- Staff maintain high levels of communication with parents. This ensures that they are actively involved and are kept fully informed of their children's progress. This provides consistency of care and learning.
- Staff have good relationships with all children and meet their needs well. As a result, children are happy, engaged and have a good sense of belonging.
- Staff promote children's health and well-being successfully. Children enjoy spending time in the garden daily, where they benefit from being outdoors in the fresh air. They use a good range of play equipment that helps to develop their balance and coordination.

It is not yet outstanding because:

Staff do not share information effectively with other settings children also attend in order to further support their learning.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

develop further the partnerships with other early years settings children attend to promote continuity of learning.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Staff are well qualified and experienced and, as a result, the quality of teaching is good. They provide a range of activities, which promotes children's learning well. Staff have high expectations of children. This helps children to develop effective skills so that they are well prepared for school. For example, children are confident to ask for help and approach staff for reassurance when needed. Children learn that words have meaning as staff read to them, which supports their early literacy skills. Children learn about numbers as staff encourage counting as they play. Staff expertly monitor and assess children's development. This means that they are able to promptly identify gaps in children's progress and plan effective support for their learning and development. Staff have established good relationships with other professionals, such as speech and language support. This ensures consistency in meeting the needs of individual children. Therefore, children make good progress in their learning.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

Staff provide a warm, welcoming and safe environment for children. Each child has an allocated key person. This promotes good relationships between children and their families with a named member of staff. This ensures that staff meet children's individual needs very well. Children are happy and confident and show that they feel safe and secure. Staff encourage children to be independent throughout the day and to self-select activities. In particular, the younger children who are still getting used to the environment. Staff are positive role models and help children learn to manage their behaviour appropriately. Children are polite and get along together well. They learn about keeping safe as they wait their turn. Staff carry out daily risk assessments, which helps to reduce hazards and promotes children's safety.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

Management and staff have a good knowledge of the requirements for safeguarding and the procedures to follow if they suspect a child is at risk of harm. This means that staff promote children's welfare securely. Management regularly monitors the quality of the provision and continues to make positive changes to improve children's learning outcomes. Management follows effective recruitment procedures to ensure the suitability of staff, for example, through vigorous checks and a detailed induction process. Managers monitor and motivate staff's professional development well through supervision, and all staff regularly attend training. For example, they attended training about meaningful interactions to enhance children's language development. This has had a positive impact on how they support all children.
