- The childminder knows how to use observation and assessment to monitor children's progress.
- The childminder provides a suitable range of toys and resources, and describes how she would help children to gain skills, such as counting and reading, in readiness for school.
- The childminder demonstrates a suitable understanding of how to work together with parents and other providers to support the learning and care needs of the children.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of how to work with other professionals to support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities.
- The childminder has a current paediatric first-aid certificate and demonstrates a suitable understanding of how she would deal with accidents or injuries.
- The childminder demonstrates a sound knowledge of appropriate behaviour management strategies.
- The childminder knows how to promote children's independence. She has a wellorganised playroom to enable children to access resources independently.
- The childminder is committed to improving the quality of her provision and attends a range of training courses to enable her to support children more effectively.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
