## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder's home is free from hazards and secure. She has suitable facilities and toys that are necessary to promote children's development.
- The childminder knows her responsibility to safeguard children and ensure the safe management of their care. She understands the procedures to follow if she has any concerns about a child being at risk of harm.
- The childminder understands how to promote and maintain children's good health. For example, she implements daily cleaning routines to reduce the spread of germs and encourages regular exercise. She ensures children have nutritious food and drinks essential for their well-being.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents to meet children's needs and to involve them in assessments to promote children's learning.
- The childminder understands the need to carry out observations, plan activities and provide age-appropriate resources to help children make progress in all areas of learning.
- The childminder has appropriately addressed the actions and recommendation set at the last inspection. The childminder has also attended training courses to update her knowledge of childcare and evaluate her practice. This has enabled her to improve her provision.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector had discussions with the childminder about her childminding practices.
- The inspector observed the whole of the ground floor area accessible to children and toys.
- The inspector looked at a range of documentation, including policies, training certificates, attendance register, accident book and children's records.
