Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of a range of different teaching strategies which she will use to promote the learning and development of children of all ages. Resources are well organised to ensure children will be able to be independent in selecting toys and in following their own play ideas.
- The childminder knows how to observe and assess children's learning. She knows how to provide a range of adult-led and child-initiated activities that children enjoy and that promote a suitable level of challenge. She knows how to establish what children can do on entry, to inform planning, and how to track children's progress from their starting points.
- The childminder has effective methods for engaging parents. She recognises the importance of finding out about individual children's care routines. She intends to plan settling-in procedures that are sufficiently flexible to help children feel secure.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's awareness of their own health and well-being, including their understanding of healthy eating and good hygiene practices.
- The childminder understands the importance of sharing with parents, detailed and comprehensive records about all aspects of the provision. Safeguarding policies and risk assessments are in place.
- The childminder shows a strong understanding of the importance of working closely in partnership with parents, other early settings or professionals involved in the care and learning of children.
- The childminder demonstrates a strong commitment to continuous improvement. She knows how to reflect on her strengths and identify areas for improvement. She understands the importance of maintaining her skills and knowledge through regular and relevant training.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

■ The inspector toured the areas of the premises where childcare will be provided.

- The inspector and the childminder discussed and looked at toys, books, resources and equipment that will be used when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programme for children.

- The inspector checked evidence of training and suitability of the childminder and other adults in the household.
