Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Teaching is good. Managers and staff have a good understanding of promoting children's learning through a wide range of stimulating and challenging activities. As a result, children make good progress from where they started.
- Managers and staff model positive behaviour towards the children, fostering a culture of respect and consideration towards others. As a result, children's behaviour is good.
- Managers and staff have developed a strong partnership with parents and carers. Parents are fully involved in their children's learning as they share information with staff on children's progress and achievements, and support learning at home.
- Managers are good role models. They use self-evaluation well to evaluate the provision and identify areas for improvement. This helps to ensure good outcomes for children.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Younger children do not always have ready access to a rich range of textures and natural materials to further promote their early experiences.
- Opportunities for children to use resources to further extend their early writing skills are not always readily available in the outdoor play area.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- extend the range of natural resources for the younger children to explore, such as sand and water, to further enhance their early experiences
- extend opportunities for children to write for different purposes, by providing more resources to promote early writing skills, particularly in the outdoor play area.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed activities throughout the nursery and outside play area.
- The inspector held discussions with the management team, and spoke with children and staff at appropriate times throughout the inspection
- The inspector sampled a range of documentation including staff suitability checks, the self-assessment information, children's observation, assessment and planning records, and documentation linked to managing children's progress.
- The inspector took into account the views of parents and carers spoken to on the day.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Managers and staff observe children regularly to identify children's interests and next steps in development. This enables them to plan specifically for the needs of each individual child. As a result, all children are motivated and enthusiastic in their learning. Children have many opportunities to develop their communication and language skills. For example, staff challenged children's thinking as they used favourite stories to introduce and point out new words, such as 'over' and 'under'. This helps to develop children's recognition of words and their listening skills. Children have many opportunities to use numbers in sequence and gain a good understanding of how to measure by size. For example, they recognised that objects are smaller, bigger, heavier or lighter as they floated boats during water play. However, staff do not provide an extended range of sensory experiences for the younger children to enable them to explore different textures and natural resources. As a result, their experiences are, at times, not as rich as possible.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

Managers and staff provide a caring and nurturing environment in which all children feel comfortable, safe and secure. This enables children to approach new situations with confidence, such as when they are ready to move on to school. Children develop a good understanding of how to keep themselves safe and healthy. For example, children fetched their own tissues, and used utensils when serving their snacks. This helps to ensure any cross contamination is minimised. Children enjoy their time in the outdoor area. For example, they balanced on logs, used ride-on toys and looked after the vegetables that they have grown. This promotes their physical development and their understanding about nature. However, staff do not use all opportunities for children to experiment and practise their early writing skills outdoors

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

Managers and staff receive up-to-date child protection training and have a secure understanding of the procedure to follow if they have concerns about a child. This helps to keep children safe. Managers place a clear emphasis on professional development, and identify staff training needs through clear induction procedures, regular appraisals and supervision arrangements. This contributes well to raising quality and outcomes for the children. Managers regularly review the educational programmes and children's learning folders. This supports staff to plan more focused interventions with individual children if needed. Managers and staff have good working relationships with the local schools, and other professionals involved with individual children and families. This is effective in promoting a shared approach to children's progress.
