Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The quality of teaching is good. The childminder has a good level of knowledge of the different ways children learn. This means she is able to support children well to make good progress.
- The childminder keeps children safe. She completes good risk assessments of her home and resources, and for outings. This helps her to identify potential hazards and minimise risks to children.
- The childminder has a good understanding of safeguarding and the procedures to follow should she have any concerns about a child. She ensures that her training and the contact details for the Local Safeguarding Children Board are up to date so that she can respond appropriately if she has any concerns.
- The childminder works effectively alongside parents and carers, involving them in all aspects of their children's learning and development. She provides daily information and suggests learning activities to share at home.
- Children are happy in their play and settle quickly because the caring childminder meets their individual needs well. She promotes their well-being and helps them to feel safe and secure.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- There are inconsistent opportunities for children to learn that print, both in English and in their home languages, carries meaning.
- Children do not have consistent opportunities to explore a range of healthy foods and learn to feed themselves.

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What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

 enhance opportunities for children to learn to feed themselves and to explore and learn about a range of healthy foods

develop further opportunities for children to understand that print has meaning by displaying words outdoors and including words that reflect children's home languages.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed children's activities and routines throughout the inspection.
- The inspector sampled documentation, including records of observations, assessments and planning to support children's progress.
- The inspector spoke with parents and took account of their views.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder about her childcare practice and her knowledge of safeguarding children.
- The inspector toured the premises used for childminding, both indoors and outdoors, and viewed a wide range of resources provided to promote children's learning and development.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

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The childminder gets to know each child very well. She introduces activities and resources to meet the individual needs and interests of the child. As a result, children are motivated to play and learn with toys and activities they find interesting. For example, young children particularly enjoy action songs and rhymes. They eagerly find the picture prop that matches the words of the song and sing and dance with the childminder. The childminder consistently supports and extends children's communication and language skills. She talks clearly as children play, repeating phrases and adding extra words to support their language development. Children benefit from easily accessible and attractively displayed resources. These allow them to make choices in their play and explorations. These skills support children's future learning in readiness for nursery and school. The childminder is skilled at incorporating mathematical learning into play and routines for all ages. For example, toddlers join in counting the cups of flour when making play dough and older children link counting with numerals.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

The childminder is friendly, caring and attentive to children's needs. She welcomes children into her homely, well-resourced environment. As a result, children form strong attachments, settle quickly and feel secure. The childminder supports children to keep safe and healthy. Children learn about hygiene, to wash their hands before eating, to drink plenty of water, and about road safety. The childminder gives children appropriate encouragement, explaining what she is praising them for. This means they understand what they have done well, which builds their skills, confidence and self-esteem. For example, when the childminder gives children a reward sticker, she explains it is because they helped tidy up. The childminder is a good role model. She uses polite language and consistently reminds children of the simple house rules. As a result, children learn to behave well.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

The childminder monitors her practice and networks with other childminders to exchange ideas, information and best practice. She attends relevant training to improve play experiences for children. For example, she developed a treasure basket for babies and toddlers following training about how young children explore and discover. The childminder monitors children's learning and development using photographs, observations and accurate assessments. These highlight children's strengths and any areas where they need further support. She uses them to help her plan very effectively for children's next steps in learning.
