Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a clear knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements. She provides appropriate learning opportunities to meet children's individual needs.
- The childminder is aware of the requirement to undertake a progress check for children aged between two and three years. She knows that she must provide a written summary of the child's progress for parents.
- The childminder knows how to take appropriate steps to promote children's safety and welfare through detailed risk assessments of the home, garden and while on outings.
- The childminder intends to gain detailed information from parents to enable her to support children's individual care and learning needs throughout the day.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with early years providers and other professionals. She intends to develop good communication processes to promote continuity of care, and support children's care and learning.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's health and well-being. She demonstrates that she would provide children with a choice of healthy snacks, meals and drinks during the day, and children will have plenty of exercise and fresh air each day.
- The childminder has a sound knowledge and understanding of child protection procedures and her responsibility to protect the welfare of the children in her care.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the childminder's home.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder regarding how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector looked at policies and documents the provider will use when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed self-evaluation and plans for improvement with the childminder.
- The inspector sampled relevant documentation, including policies, procedures and the suitability of all members of the household and the childminder's assistant.
