Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Children make very good progress in their learning and development due to the high standards set by the leadership team and the experience of staff who continue to reflect upon and strengthen the quality of their teaching.
- All staff make accurate observations and assessments of what children know and can do. They regularly update parents on their children's good progress and celebrate children's achievements at home.
- Staff quickly identify any gaps or delays in children's progress and implement highly effective interventions with the special educational needs coordinator, parents and external agencies, promptly.
- Staff help to prepare children well for changes in their lives. Children are socially, emotionally and developmentally ready for their move to school.
- Staff are highly effective in developing positive partnerships with parents to support children's learning, development and well-being. Staff regularly seek parents' views and respond professionally to any concerns.
- Senior staff monitor the delivery of the education programmes, planning and assessment very effectively.

It is not yet outstanding because:

Children enjoy planting a small range of vegetables and fruits. However, staff do not always fully support children to understand that these need nurturing, and that they need time to grow and ripen.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

build on children's interest in living things to strengthen their understanding of how plants, people and/or creatures grow or change over time.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed a wide range of activities across all areas of the pre-school and talked with staff and children about what they were doing.
- The inspector reviewed documents and procedures relating to safeguarding, staffing, supervision, risk assessment, equal opportunities, and health and safety, and checked a selection of other policies.
- The inspector sampled a range of children's records and the pre-school's systems for planning, evaluation and exchanging information with parents and external professionals.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents spoken to on the day and reviewed written communication from parents.
- The inspector met with the leadership team and conducted a joint observation with the acting manager.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Children make good progress in their learning. Staff ensure children develop secure foundations for all future learning through a keen and successful focus on targeting children's personal and communication skills. Children use language well to organise their play and share their thoughts and ideas with each other and adults. Staff quickly identify any gaps or delays in children's progress and design activities to help meet their individual needs and help them flourish. Experienced staff have a secure knowledge of how children learn through play. They carefully plan a wide range of activities that interest, engage and challenge children effectively. Consequently, children are enthusiastic and have a good disposition towards investigating and creating. Children take an interest in garden insects, and have a small planting area. However, staff do not always fully develop children's understanding of growth, nurturing and change in their environment.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is outstanding

Staff work closely and very effectively with parents and carers to settle children into the pre-school and later to prepare them for their move to school. Children are happy and secure in the highly stimulating environment staff create for them. Children are confident to explore new activities and build positive relationships with each other. Staff help children develop an excellent understanding of how to keep themselves safe as they teach them how to assess and manage many everyday risks. For example, children enjoy balancing on a low wall, but know they must jump off at the 'stop' sign. They also choose to wear a helmet when cycling. Children develop very healthy lifestyles as they relish playing and exploring in the excellent outdoor area and exercise their bodies in daily workouts. Staff encourage children to practise using equipment safely as they spread with knives, use tool kits and work with computer tablets.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

Leadership and management of the pre-school are strong. They use self-evaluation well to continually improve the provision and outcomes for children. Committed, capable staff work smoothly with the parent committee to implement all the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. There is tight monitoring of education programmes and regular staff supervision and training from the highly qualified manager. For example, staff training in mathematics now clearly benefits children's understanding and use of numbers. Staff safeguard children's welfare extremely well because all have a thorough understanding of child protection issues and what to do if they have any concerns about a child in their care. Standards of care, welfare and safety across the pre-school are high. There is a wide range of initiatives to engage, support and build on parents' interest in their children's development in order to provide continuity in children's learning.
