# **Summary of key findings for parents**

#### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a sound understanding of the learning and development requirements and her role to promote children's learning, through observations and assessments. She understands the importance of considering children's backgrounds, skills and interests in order to meet their needs.
- The childminder provides a child-friendly and homely environment. She offers interesting resources, attractively displayed where children can easily access them.
- The childminder understands the importance of promoting healthy lifestyles and maintaining children's good health. She recognises the importance of providing nutritious meals that meet children's dietary needs and the need to provide opportunities for outdoor experiences.
- The childminder has sufficient understanding of child protection issues. She understands her responsibility to report any concerns about children's welfare and keep appropriate records.
- The childminder understands the need to keep children safe and to manage their behaviour appropriately. She knows the importance of undertaking effective risk assessments to reduce any hazards and promote children's safety.
- The childminder is aware of the importance of partnership working with parents and other early years providers to support continuity in children's care and learning.
- The childminder knows the importance of improving her provision for children. She recently attended training to ensure that she keeps her knowledge up to date and to enhance children's overall learning experiences.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
