## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a good knowledge of the Early Years Foundation Stage. She knows how to implement the requirements effectively.
- The childminder has appropriate resources for both adult-led and child-initiated purposeful play. She knows the types of activities she can offer children to promote all areas of learning, and how she can adapt these to support children's needs and interests.
- The childminder fully understands her responsibility to safeguard children. She has attended child protection training and values the importance of teaching children about how they can keep themselves safe from harm. Therefore, the childminder demonstrates her ability to help protect children's safety and welfare.
- The childminder regularly checks her home and the quality of toys to ensure that any risks are minimised. This helps to keep children safe.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of how to support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. This promotes an inclusive service.
- The childminder has arrangements for self-evaluation in place. She values feedback from parents and children, in order to identify any areas of practice that could be improved.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector looked around the childminder's home and garden and at the resources available for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to provide a range of activities and experiences for children to support their learning.
- The inspector talked with the childminder about how she keeps children safe and protects them from potential harm.
- The inspector reviewed the childminder's policies and documentation, including those for assessing children's development and for safeguarding.
