Summary of key findings for parents

This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- The provider does not always make effective use of the available space inside and outdoors to provide a calm environment for children to play comfortably. As a result, children are not able to fully concentrate due to the noise level.
- Some activities led by adults are not effective. This is because staff do not give children clear instructions, which results in disorganisation at times and hinders children's learning experiences.
- Staff do not always extend children's mathematical skills during activities, in particularly their understanding of numbers and counting to help them progress further.
- The management team does not effectively review the quality of the provision to identify areas that require development. Therefore, they miss opportunities to fully drive forward improvement.

It has the following strengths

- Staff make suitable use of the different languages they speak to support children's varying communication needs.
- Staff have a clear understanding of how to safeguard children, including the procedures to follow if they have a concern about a child's welfare.
- Staff make effective use of everyday routines to build children's independence. Therefore, children learn to manage their self-care skills in preparation for their future move to school.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage the provider must:

- ensure the premises are organised in a way that meets the needs of children at all times
- improve staff knowledge of planning suitable adult-led activities that engage all children in learning more effectively.

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- provide more opportunities for children to develop their mathematical skills, in particular their recognition of numbers and counting
- review self-evaluation processes to accurately identify areas of strengths and further development, and to consistently improve the quality of the provision.

Inspection activities

- The inspector spent the majority of the inspection observing the interaction between children and staff in the nursery and garden area.
- The inspector sampled children's information and development records.
- The inspector held discussions with the manager.
- The inspector spoke to some parents regarding the nursery.
- The inspector and manager completed a joint observation in the play room.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This requires improvement

Staff maintain children's learning records, which include details about their likes, dislikes and interests; they use this information to plan suitable activities. However, the quality of teaching is variable at times. This is because some activities led by staff are not effective due to the large number of children taking part all at one time; this hinders children's enjoyment and concentration level. Despite this, staff set up the play room ensuring that there is a suitable range of resources available for children to explore. In addition, staff store toys at low-level to encourage children to make free choices and lead their own play. Staff promote children's interest in nature and, therefore, children enjoy learning about the lifecycle of the caterpillar. However, staff miss opportunities during some activities to extend children's recognition of numbers and counting skills.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children requires improvement

Staff generally provide a safe environment for children and offer age-appropriate resources. However, staff do not always make the best use of all the space available to fully engage children and reduce the noise level, particularly indoors. Staff suitably implement the key-person system and offer flexible settling-in sessions, which they adapt for each child to meet their emotional well-being. Staff are aware of children's individual dietary needs when preparing snacks, which includes a variety of fruit and vegetables; this helps to promote healthy lifestyles. Staff welcome parents and extended family members, such as grandparents, to stay and help their children become familiar and confident in the nursery. Parents comment that they are happy overall with the care. Staff develop effective links with other professionals, in particular the local schools, to support children when they move on to the next stage of their learning.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision requires improvement

The provider maintains the required adult-to-child ratios and is aware of space requirements. However, she does not organise the premises effectively to ensure children benefit from all available space, to improve the quality of learning experiences for children. The manager carries out regular staff supervision and appraisal meetings, and uses these opportunities to discuss individual performance and areas for improvement. Consequently, staff have attended behaviour management training and have implemented positive changes to promote children's well-being. The management and staff team use self-evaluation processes to target some areas for development. For example, they are continuing to develop the outdoor area. However, they do not always focus on fully identifying all weaknesses in practice in order to raise the quality of the provision.
