Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Children enjoy excellent relationships with their friends and staff. They learn to take on the responsibility for small tasks, such as watering their plants. As a result, they are extremely independent, confident and responsible.
- Children experience a rich variety of highly challenging activities, which staff carefully plan. As a result, staff effectively promote children's wellbeing and their physical development as they learn.
- All staff receive robust, ongoing training in child protection and safeguarding issues, and know what to do in the event of a concern about a child. Children's welfare is very well promoted as a result of robust recruitment measures and well-implemented policies and procedures.
- Teaching is good and staff ensure children make good progress. This is especially evident in their communication and mathematical skills and their appreciation of nature. Therefore, children are well prepared for going to school.
- All staff, parents and children are considered in the self-evaluation process. This means that plans for improvement are comprehensive and well thought through, and result in good outcomes for children.

It is not yet outstanding because:

Staff do not provide consistent opportunities for children to see and recognise simple words in everyday routines, so do not fully extend their early reading skills.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

review opportunities for children to see letters and words during everyday routines and activities in order to fully promote their early reading skills.

- The inspector had a tour of the premises with the managers.
- The inspector held joint observations with the provider.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents.
- The inspector observed children's activities and routines and sampled children's records.
- The inspector held a leadership and management meeting with the provider and sampled required documentation.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Staff promote children's concentration and communication skills well. This is because they are involved in their play, talk with them, introduce new words and comment on what they are doing. Staff give children plenty of uninterrupted time to play and explore. They base their planning on their careful observations of the children. Children are very physically active and gain an understanding of nature as they enjoy exploring logs and looking for bugs using magnifying glasses outside. Music activities and resources allow children to extend their listening skills and a very well-resourced writing and arts area promotes their small muscle skills. This effectively supports children's development of early literacy skills. Parents say they feel very involved in their children's learning.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is outstanding

Staff are caring, highly skilled and sensitive in helping young children form strong bonds and positive relationships. They successfully settle children and help them through times of change extremely well. Therefore, children become confident, independent learners. Staff successfully promote children's health and well-being. Children eat healthy meals and learn good hygiene habits. Children enjoy learning outside and skilfully explore and investigate. For example, they learn to climb on structures safely and follow safety guidance extremely well. Staff are excellent role models. They are kind and gentle when speaking and giving instructions to the children. As a result, older children learn to play cooperatively with younger children and there is an exciting but calm atmosphere. Children learn to manage their own personal needs extremely well for their ages, in readiness for school.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

The leadership team strives to provide the very best quality care and learning for children. Systems to monitor how well children progress in their learning are continually being reviewed and improved by managers. There are robust systems to check that staff are suitable to work with children. Staff take all necessary steps to protect children and to keep them safe and healthy. The staff work closely with parents to promote children's development and provide them with ideas to extend learning at home. Specialist training, such as how to teach children outdoors, and regular staff supervision meetings have a very positive effect on children's care and education.
