Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder provides good support for children's key areas of development. This prepares them well for their next stage of learning and school. Children are confident and independent. They communicate well and practise new skills until they are competent.
- The childminder actively engages children in enjoying books. They demonstrate excitement at acting out the different characters and older children recite speech. As a result, all children engage fully, listen well and concentrate during group stories.
- The childminder and her co-minder work well together to enable children to make full use of the premises. They organise the wide range of resources effectively so that children make choices and move resources to where they prefer to use them.
- Frequent observations and assessments enable the childminder to plan effectively for children's next stages of learning and development. This means that all children make good progress.
- The childminder works closely with her co-minder and parents to evaluate the practice and implement positive changes to provide good outcomes for children. For example, through parents' feedback, they now offer more outings to widen children's experiences and their understanding of their community.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- The childminder does not use all activities and opportunities to help children learn about cause and effect, such as why butter melts or books blow away in the wind.
- During some adult-led activities, the childminder does not always support children fully in their creative imagination.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- use all experiences for children to develop their awareness of cause and effect, to promote their understanding of the world further
- extend children's creative imagination in adult-led activities.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed activities and the quality of teaching indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder at convenient times and carried out a joint observation.
- The inspector spoke to parents, took account of their written feedback in the parents' survey, and the self-evaluation.
- The inspector checked safeguarding information and the premises.
- The inspector sampled documentation, including policies and procedures, children's development records and planning.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Overall, the quality of teaching is good. The childminder encourages children's communication skills well through group discussions. Children are eager to share their news, which led to them going out to see if the baby birds had left their nest. The childminder followed children's lead, such as noticing how big the courgettes had grown. They cut them open and discussed the seeds inside. The childminder supports children's independence well, providing effective support where needed. Even the youngest children find their own shoes and learn to feed themselves. The childminder supports older children in sounding letters and writing their names. She attends regular training and, as a result, she plans the outdoor environment more effectively to cover all areas of development. This supports those children who prefer outdoor learning.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

The childminder helps children to settle quickly on arrival because she knows what they enjoy doing. This helps children feel emotionally secure. Children learn to play cooperatively and older children are sensitive to the younger children's abilities. Children have good space to play and use a wide range of appropriate resources. Many are at low-level to enable children to make independent choices and use resources where they prefer. For example, a toddler selected a book and took it outside to look at. Children sit together for meals with the childminder, making it an occasion where they learn good social skills from positive role models. Children develop a good understanding of safe and healthy lifestyles. They know to remove their shoes and wash their hands after playing outside. Children demonstrate they understand the childminder's expectations and that some boundaries are to keep them safe. They wear safety helmets when riding bicycles and discuss which way to go to prevent collisions, for example.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

The childminder has a good awareness of her responsibilities and implements her safeguarding procedures well to keep children safe. Through regular training, she knows what to do should a child be at risk of harm. Following the last inspection, all children now take part in practising the emergency evacuation procedures so that they can help with their own safety. In addition, the childminder uses a communication book to share information with other early years providers. This helps her to monitor children's development more effectively and have a consistent approach. The childminder has strong partnerships with parents, which has a positive impact on children's welfare and learning. The childminder continues to extend her knowledge through training. She is committed to providing good quality care and works closely with her co-minder to achieve this.

The childminder registered in 2010. She works from the home of her co-childminder in the dedicated premises on their farm in the village of Middle Chinnock, near Crewkerne, Somerset. The childminder provides care for 49 weeks a year, including before and after school.

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
