Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Overall, the quality of teaching is good. Staff observe children and use this information to plan activities that meet their needs well. This ensures children make good progress and gain the skills they need for a successful move to school when the time comes.
- Parents are delighted with the care and education their children receive. They feel well informed about their children's progress and value the support staff offer to enable them to continue this learning at home.
- The owner and manager ensure all staff share their understanding about how to safeguard children. All staff take sensible steps to keep children safe and know what to do if concerned about a child's welfare.
- Children develop trusting and happy relationships with the staff that look after them. This promotes a sense of security and has a positive impact on their well-being.
- The managers organise a comprehensive range of training opportunities for all staff. This helps to ensure staff's knowledge and skills remain up-to-date and enables them to continue to meet the needs of all children well.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- On occasion, the opportunities for children to engage in freely-chosen play experiences indoors are more limited compared to those which are adult-led, and staff do not always make the most of these to extend children's learning as fully as possible.
- Staff do not always effectively manage routine times for older children. For example, when older children are sleeping or resting, there are fewer activities on offer for the other children, including those arriving for the afternoon, to use.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- review and improve the opportunities for children to engage in freely-chosen play, particularly indoors, to improve further the outcomes for all children
- develop how daily routine times are consistently used to help build on older children's learning.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed children and staff both indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector conducted a joint observation with the provider.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents spoken to on the day.
- The inspector spoke with staff about their understanding of safeguarding, child protection and first aid.
- The inspector sampled documentation, including policies, children's records and staff's qualifications.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Staff know the children well and consider their interests and stages of development when organising activities. Those caring for babies and very young children ensure there are lots of opportunities for them to crawl and explore. They make good use of opportunities to introduce new language and teach new skills. For example, staff encourage children to name items they find together in the sand, and teach children how to scoop and dig. Toddlers learn to play cooperatively when playing listening games. Older children learn about weight and measurement when transporting sand and water outside. Staff value the importance of developing children's communication and literacy skills. They encourage parents to borrow books to continue this learning at home. On occasion, children's learning is interrupted; for example, staff ask older children to go and wash their hands ready for mealtimes when they are in the middle of listening to a story.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

Children's care needs are well met. Staff ensure the nursery is clean, safe and welcoming. They check for hazards and take the necessary steps to minimise risks. They ensure all children are well prepared when they move to new rooms within the nursery, and allow children to make frequent, short visits to get to know staff. As a result, these moves are managed extremely well and children continue to feel happy and confident. All children learn about the benefits of a healthy lifestyle. They have daily opportunities to play in the fresh air and meals are nutritious and appetising. Children's learning is furthered because they plant and harvest vegetables to be used by the cook. Staff looking after the youngest children play close attention to their routines from home and follow them at nursery to provide continuity and a sense of security.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

The manager and owner understand the responsibilities of their roles and fulfil them well. They regularly review all aspects of the provision and consider how they can further improve what they do. For example, they have made significant improvements to the outdoor area since the last inspection. Children now have lots of opportunities to play imaginatively and to make choices about what they would like to do when outdoors. This demonstrates a good capacity for further improvement. Managers are currently considering how they can improve further the opportunities for children to explore their creativity. They ensure all staff have opportunities to reflect on their practice. They organise their team to ensure that more highly qualified staff can share their skills with colleagues, which helps ensure good standards are maintained.

The Sandcastle Nursery registered in 2011. It is situated in High Wycombe, Buckinghamshire. The nursery operates from Monday to Friday throughout the year, with the exception of a week at Christmas and bank holidays. It is open from 8am until 6pm. It receives funding to provide free early years education for children aged two, three and four years. There are 32 members of staff who work directly with the children. Of these, 24 hold relevant childcare qualifications between level 2 and level 6, including two members of staff who hold Early Years Professional Status.

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
