The provision meets requirements

- The childminder provides a welcoming environment for children. A suitable variety of resources are available for children of different ages, abilities and backgrounds.
- The childminder understands how to put appropriate procedures in place to promote children's safety. She knows how to risk assess her home and make sure precautions are in place according to children's age and needs. She is familiar with possible signs of child abuse or neglect, and understands the steps to take if she has concerns about a child's welfare.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's good health and well-being. She knows how to plan suitable meals and snacks and how to help children learn good hygiene routines. She talks to parents before children start so that she is familiar with children's individual needs.
- The childminder understands the records that she is required to keep for childminding.
- The childminder knows how to provide a range of experiences for children based on their age and needs. She understands how to assess children's development and plan activities that will interest them and help them make progress in their learning.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents. She provides parents with regular feedback about children's progress and care. She understands the need to work closely with teachers and any other professionals involved with a child.
- The childminder shows a positive attitude to continually developing her skills, for example by attending local training.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
