# **Summary of key findings for parents**

#### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a very good understanding of the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. She has attended relevant training and works closely with the Local Authority Advisor to ensure she continually updates her skills and knowledge.
- The childminder fully understands how to promote children's learning and development across all seven areas. She has good systems in place to observe and assess children, in order to track their ongoing progress and address any gaps in their learning.
- The childminder has an excellent range of resources to meet the different ages and abilities of individual children. These are easily accessible and appropriately labelled, in order to enable children to make independent choices.
- The childminder shows a commitment to working in partnership with parents and local primary schools. She discusses the importance of establishing a consistent approach in order to support children's future moves on to the next stage in their learning.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to safeguard children. She confidently discusses the procedures to follow if she has any safeguarding concerns and is fully aware of possible signs and symptoms of abuse.
- The childminder discusses the importance of ensuring children have daily opportunities for physical play, exercise and fresh air. In addition, she talks about good hygiene practices and reinforcing safety in order to promote children's health and well-being.
- The childminder uses self-evaluation systems and has devised action plans to support this process. She fully understands the importance of reflecting on her practice to identify her strengths and areas for future development.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to manage children's behaviour. She talks about using a positive approach and providing children with lots of praise and encouragement, in order to help them to understand the boundaries.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
