Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Management and staff fully understand their roles and responsibilities to protect children from harm and are aware of the action to take if they are concerned about a child's welfare. As a result, children are safeguarded effectively and well cared for.
- Staff communicate with children well, engaging in conversations, extending their thoughts and valuing what children have to say.
- Staff are good role models. Consequently, children of all ages play very well together and develop positive social skills and good behaviour.
- Children have excellent opportunities for active play indoors and outdoors. This
 promotes their physical development and well-being effectively.
- Staff provide children with a stimulating range of activities. As a result, children settle quickly and enjoy their time at the club.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff keep children safe, but do not always help children to think about their own safety during physical play. Therefore, children do not have consistent opportunities to assess risks for themselves as they move around and play.
- Although staff ensure that children get to know the daily routines of camp, sometimes moves to different activities take too long. Therefore, not all children listen when instructions are being given as they are keen to get on with their play.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen opportunities for children to learn how to keep themselves safe during physical play, to help them assess risk as they move around in different ways
- organise changes in routine more effectively so that children are able to further develop their play interests.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed staff and children's interactions during play activities inside and outdoors.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector spoke with parents to seek their views about the holiday camp.
- The inspector held discussions with the manager, staff and children.
- The inspector sampled several policies and children's development records.

Inspection findings

How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Children are engaged and concentrate well as they participate in activities. They particularly enjoy creative activities and staff show them a variety of techniques to create items with clay, including using twigs and toy cars to make patterns. Staff provide activities that contribute to children's good health. For example, children develop good physical skills as they participate in daily dance classes. Staff make regular observations of the children who attend each day to plan effectively to meet their interests. Staff make time to engage in children's play, successfully extending children's enjoyment and understanding of different activities. Children learn to solve problems as staff provide resources to develop their creativity and communication skills. For example, children work out what they need to make the right consistency of dough.

The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

Relationships between children of different ages are strong. The older children help and support younger ones, for example, when putting shoes on. This has a positive impact on children's emotional well-being. Children do not always attend the same schools, so look forward to meeting each other every day they attend. Consequently, children feel a strong sense of community. Children with additional needs are fully included in all activities. This is because staff work together to encourage open communication, teaching all children sign language. Staff have rigorous routines to support children's independence. For example, they encourage children to hang up their belongings when they arrive and to wash their hands after using the toilet. Staff work in partnerships with parents to ensure that children have healthy and nutritious meals and snacks to promote their good health.

The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

Children's safety is protected extremely well because staff have a good awareness and understanding of safeguarding and child protection issues. Risk assessments are carried out regularly to minimise danger, and security is paramount. Staff ensure that parents and carers follow robust procedures when collecting their children. For example, on arrival, staff direct families into the grounds to ensure safety while driving and parking. Staff are deployed effectively to ensure children are supervised at all times in the indoor and outdoor environments. Staff identify areas for improvement and have made excellent progress in addressing recommendations from the previous inspection. Through the use of effective evaluation systems, the manager and staff take the views of parents, carers, and children into consideration when identifying priorities for action.
