## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements. She also understands how to provide a good balance of child-led and planned activities, using a good range of resources.
- The childminder holds a current paediatric first-aid certificate and understands how to react in the event of an accident or emergency.
- The childminder has public liability insurance and understands how to carry out effective risk assessments inside the home and on outings to keep children safe.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's well-being and welfare. She knows the procedures for notifying Ofsted of relevant matters and has attended safeguarding training. She has a suitable understanding of the signs that may cause her concern and the reporting procedures to follow.
- The childminder has met the action and recommendations set at the previous inspection. She understands the importance of reflecting on her practice when caring for children and keeping up-to-date with requirements.
- The childminder understands her responsibility to work in partnership with parents and other early years settings, to ensure she meets children's individual care and learning needs.
- The childminder is committed to continual professional development and understands the need to regularly attend training to develop her skills.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
