### Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision is good

- The childminder has a good knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. She understands how children learn and uses a variety of teaching techniques to ensure those of all ages and capabilities make good progress.
- Children's early language skills are promoted well. The childminder continually talks to the children as they play together and uses word repetition to help them build their communication skills.
- The childminder ensures that she works effectively in partnership with other agencies. She knows how to access additional support if a child needs it to help them make even better progress.
- Effective partnerships with other settings that children attend help to promote continuity and consistency in their learning.
- The childminder reflects on her practice well and regularly reviews and monitors what she does. This means that she continually improves and develops her provision for the children, which has a positive effect on their care and learning.
- The childminder has a sound understanding of safeguarding. Good policies and procedures and risk assessments are in place.

#### It is not yet outstanding because:

■ The childminder does not gather enough details about children's prior learning to quickly establish starting points when they first join the setting.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

find out more about what children already know and can do when they first join the setting and quickly establish accurate starting points for their learning.

- The inspector spoke with the childminder and interacted with children at various times throughout the inspection.
- The inspector conducted a joint observation with the childminder.
- The inspector observed activities in the main play area and outside.
- The inspector checked the evidence of the suitability of all household members, the childminder's qualifications and discussed the childminder's self-evaluation.
- The inspector discussed safeguarding and child protection with the childminder.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's observations, assessments, planning and monitoring.

### **Inspection findings**

## How well the early years provision meets the needs of the range of children who attend. This is good

Teaching is good. The childminder uses observations and assessments of children's progress to inform her planning. However, she does not find out enough about what children already know and can do, in order to help her quickly establish starting points when they first join the setting. Parents are able to extend children's learning at home because the childminder shares relevant information with them. The childminder plans activities very well and is clear about what she wants the children to learn. The childminder consistently supports and extends children's communication and language skills. She talks clearly as children play, repeating phrases and adding extra words to support their language development. Young children recognise simple shapes, colours and numbers. They are making good progress in their overall development.

## The contribution of the early years provision to the well-being of children is good

The childminder has a warm and caring manner which helps children to quickly develop attachments to her. Meals and snacks are healthy and nutritious and children spend lots of time outdoors. Therefore, they are developing healthy lifestyles. The childminder gives children time to do things for themselves, so they are developing their independence and self-care skills. For example, they are learning to put on and take off their own shoes and to change their own clothes. Children behave well because the childminder is a good role model. She also agrees some simple house rules with children. For example, they know they have to sit at the table to eat and that they should tidy their toys away after playing with them. Children develop their social skills when they go to toddler groups and visit their local school. This supports them emotionally with their move to nursery or school.

## The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the early years provision is good

The childminder is aware of her responsibilities to supervise children and protect them from harm. The childminder tracks children's development precisely and plans an effective range of activities that build on their interests and help them to make good progress in their learning. She has built good links with parents and this ensures children's care needs are identified and quickly met. The well-qualified childminder attends training courses and uses online resources and information to update her knowledge. In addition, the childminder actively participates in a local cluster group of childminders, sharing ideas and good practice. Consequently, she is continually reviewing her practice and taking positive steps towards improvement.
