Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates a good knowledge of how children learn. She explains how she observes children to gain an understanding of their interests and skills. She plans activities that are enjoyable and support children to make progress.
- The childminder has recently attended child protection training and has a clear procedure in place should she have concerns about a child's welfare. The childminder demonstrates that she has a good understanding of how to identify possible hazards for children. She explains how she teaches children to start to recognise dangers for themselves.
- Since her last inspection the childminder has shown a commitment to driving improvement. She has developed appropriate methods to gather parental consent to give medication and she has worked upon the recommendations that were raised.
- The childminder recognises the importance of building good relationships with parents. She demonstrates how she works with parents to keep them informed of the progress their child is making and how they can further support learning at home.
- The childminder also recognises the importance of working in partnership with other settings that children attend. She demonstrates through discussion how she builds links with the settings in order to offer consistency for the child's learning, development and emotional well-being.
- Through discussion, the childminder demonstrates that she has a good understanding of how to support children's emotional well-being. She has settling-in sessions that are tailored to children's individual needs. The childminder gathers a range of information from parents to help her to meet the needs of the children when they first start in her care.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
