Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Staff to child ratios are not consistently maintained and staff deployment is chaotic. Staff move around various rooms when required. This results in an ineffective key person system and children's needs are not always met.
- Security at the nursery is poor, allowing free and unrestricted entry into the setting. This compromises children's safety.
- Staff do not have sufficient knowledge and understanding of the signs and indicators of abuse, so they cannot be sure children are protected and kept safe.
- The quality of teaching is poor. Staff do not effectively plan for children's learning due to their limited knowledge of the Early Years Foundation Stage. Activities are poor and lack direction, so children do not make the best possible progress in their learning.
- Assessments of children's progress are not up to date. Children do not have next steps in their development identified, to help them to make good progress and support their readiness for school.
- Managers do not effectively monitor the consistency of practice and teaching and learning throughout the nursery and self-evaluation does not adequately identify areas for improvement.

It has the following strengths

- Children are developing their understanding of how to be healthy by learning to wash their hands prior to eating.
- Parents spoke positively about the friendly and approachable staff team, which makes them feel welcome at the nursery.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action We will issue a Welfare Requirements Notice requiring the provider to:

- The inspectors looked at a range of documentation including nursery policies and procedures, records of children's progress, staff files and the nursery's self-evaluation form.
- The inspectors talked to parents who were available on the day of inspection to seek their views.
- The inspectors spoke to the manager and staff about key children, planning, activities and safeguarding.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Staff do not have sufficient knowledge and understanding of the signs and indicators of abuse, which impacts on how children are protected. The leadership team does not effectively monitor the consistency of practice and teaching and learning throughout the nursery. The use of unqualified and temporary staff has a negative impact on the quality of teaching overall. Children with English as an additional language and those with disabilities are not well supported. Management failed to identify any funded children or how funding could impact on closing the gaps in children's learning. Self-evaluation does not adequately identify areas for improvement or take account of parents and children's views. Breaches of requirements, in relation to staffing ratios and security of the premises, results in children's individual needs not being met and their safety being compromised.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

The quality of teaching is poor. Staff do not effectively plan for children's learning due to their limited knowledge of the Early Years Foundation Stage. Staff informed the inspector 'we don't plan we just decide on the day what to do.' Activities are poor and lack direction and the curriculum does not encompass all areas of learning. This results in children not making the best possible progress in their learning, especially in relation to being ready for school. Assessments of children's progress are not regularly completed. Children do not have the next steps in their learning identified, to help them to make the best possible progress. Parents contribute to children's starting points on entry, which helps staff to get to know the children initially. However, parent's knowledge of their child is not always taken account of or used to inform assessments of what children know and can do.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Relationships between staff and children are not consistently good. This is because staff deployment is chaotic and involves staff moving into various nursery rooms when required, which results in an ineffective key person system. In the baby room staff informed the inspector they did not know about the learning or care needs of all children for whom they were responsible, as a result children's individual needs are not met. Children learn about how to be healthy through activities which include the washing of hands prior to eating, although meals are not always healthy and nutritious. Children receive plenty of opportunities for physical activity in the outdoor area. Staff offer praise to children when they achieve and behave well, which helps in developing their confidence and self-esteem. Children are taught about the similarities and differences between themselves and others which helps them to learn about the wider world.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Leaders and managers have a poor understanding of the statutory framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage. The quality of teaching, safeguarding and the key-person system is weak which means that outcomes for children are inadequate.

Silver Birches Nursery School Ltd was registered in 2001 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory and voluntary parts of the Childcare Register. It is in a large, detached property situated in the Fulwood area of Preston and is privately owned and managed. The nursery serves the local area and is accessible to all children. It operates from 10 rooms and the children also have access to two outdoor play areas.

The nursery employs 10 members of childcare staff, of these; eight hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 2 and above. The manager has Early Years Professional Status. The nursery opens Monday to Friday, all year round. Sessions are from 7am until 6pm. Children attend for a variety of sessions. There are currently 57 children on roll, of which; 57 of them are in the early years age group. The nursery provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-olds. It supports children who speak English as an additional language and children with special educational needs and/or disabilities.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the Early Years Foundation Stage.
