Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Recruitment and vetting procedures, behaviour management and record keeping are not good enough to ensure children are safeguarded at all times.
- Staff do not plan a range of outdoor activities or enable children to access the outdoors on a daily basis. As a result, children do not benefit from regular fresh air or opportunities to play and learn outside.
- Some staff have a poor understanding of observation, assessment and planning for children's next steps. The educational programmes do not have sufficient depth and breadth to ignite all children's interests and challenge them. Children are not consistently engaged in purposeful activities and play that is matched to their differing age and abilities.
- Too many children do not make the progress they are capable of making in their learning and development because of weaknesses in teaching.
- The manager does not monitor the quality of the setting well enough. Consequently, there are several breaches of the learning and development and welfare requirements.

It has the following strengths

Staff build effective relationships with children. They provide verbal reassurance, praise and play alongside the children. This helps children to form secure emotional attachments and promotes their sense of security and belonging.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The arrangements for safeguarding children are ineffective. Staff do not effectively manage children's behaviour. At times, children are physically handled by staff who take them by the upper arm, to get them to sit down. When children arrive at the setting with injuries they are not always noted and some entries are not accurately recorded. Leaders do not always seek written references as part of their suitability checks when recruiting new staff. Staff know how to report child protection concerns. It is not clear how many staff are trained to administer first aid to children. The system used to ensure all recruitment checks on staff have been completed is not robust. The manager is well qualified and has started to tackle weaknesses. However, she has yet to fully implement effective monitoring and performance management processes. The quality of teaching is variable and children do not benefit from consistently good learning experiences.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

The impact of teaching on children's progress is inadequate. Children do not make the progress they are capable of because some staff have poor knowledge of how to promote children's learning and development and do not know what children need to learn next. Staff do not effectively carry out evaluative observations across all areas of learning to identify the next steps in the children's learning and development. The manager and staff do not track the progress of individuals or groups of children appropriately, so the gaps in children's knowledge are not closed. Curriculum planning is ineffective. Some activities on offer are uninspiring and fail to engage children's interest. Too often, children spend time wandering around the setting without having anything meaningful to do. The teaching is not matched well enough to children's needs; staff fail to support children with additional needs. There is not enough challenge for children who are more able. This slows down their learning. Staff have made some links with local schools and other professionals such as the local authority area special educational needs co-ordinator.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Due to weaknesses in the safeguarding procedures, children's welfare is not protected. Parents and carers say that they are happy with the nursery. They say that staff keep them well-informed about their child's learning. There is an appropriate key person system in place to support children's emotional well-being. Staff and children have warm relationships. Staff act as good role models as they encourage children to share, take turns and be polite. Snack times are social occasions when children gain independence and social skills. However, inflexible tidy up routines stop children from continuing their learning.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

There is a lack of consistency in teaching, observation and assessment. As a result, children, including those with disabilities and special educational needs, do not make enough progress in developing the skills that they need in readiness for starting school.

Ar Risaalah Nursery was registered in 2014 and is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. The nursery provision is based in the Green Heath Independent School, in the Small Heath area of Birmingham and is managed by Ar Risaalah Academy. The nursery serves the local area and is accessible to all children. It operates from one large playroom and the nursery have use of the school sports hall. The nursery employs eight members of child care staff. Of these, four hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3 or above. The nursery opens Monday to Friday all year round. Sessions are from 8am until 5pm. Children attend for a variety of sessions. The nursery provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children. It supports a number of children who speak English as an additional language and children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. The nursery follows an Islamic ethos.

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
