# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- Leaders and staff protect children well. They have up-to-date safeguarding training and know what signs may indicate a child is at risk of harm and how to keep children safe.
- Managers, staff and parents work well together as a team to set clear targets for the nursery. These help to ensure that the quality of care and learning is improving and meeting children's needs.
- Staff gather useful initial information from parents about children's needs and preferences. They use this information to help children form secure emotional attachments with staff and settle quickly.
- Children are confident learners. Staff complete observations and regular assessments that help them identify what children can do. They use this information to plan engaging activities that help to ensure all children learn important skills for the future.
- Children benefit from staff's well-developed relationships with external agencies. These help to ensure that any gaps in learning identified by the manager's careful monitoring of children's progress are closing.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff practice is not always as consistent as possible and some staff have higher expectations of children than others.
- Staff do not always encourage children's early reading skills and help them learn to enjoy books. As a result, children's interest in reading and books is limited.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen the consistency of staff practice and their expectations of children's behaviour and what they can do
- strengthen the opportunities for children to develop an interest in books and practise their early reading skills.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed children during activities indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector spoke with parents and took account of their views.
- The inspector carried out two joint observations with the leader.
- The inspector spoke to leaders, staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector looked at children's records, planning information, the setting's selfevaluation, evidence of staff's suitability and a range of other documentation, including policies and procedures.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Leaders and managers understand their responsibility to protect children and keep them safe. Staff receive regular and up-to-date training and information that help them protect children. The Teaching & Learning Co-ordinator has a very good understanding of the legal requirements. She is passionate about providing the best possible outcome for children and works closely with managers and staff to maintain high-quality childcare. Overall, ongoing staff supervision helps leaders to identify professional development needs quickly and raise the quality of staff practice. The impact of this is clear throughout the nursery as lots of positive changes have taken place since the last inspection. For example, staff now evaluate their managers. Managers use this assessment to understand staff expectations and make significant improvements to their own practice. This helps to drive improvement in all areas.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Overall, staff understand how children learn and plan challenging learning experiences based on their interests and which cover all areas of learning. This helps children to make good progress. Children have many opportunities to develop their early writing skills. For example, they have easy access to resources that allow them to experiment with painting, drawing or writing. They learn new vocabulary during activities and staff take every opportunity to encourage children's mathematical skills. Staff build effective relationships with parents, helping them to continue their children's learning at home. For example, they learn about child development and how to observe and assess their children's learning.

## Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children are happy to learn. Staff praise them exceptionally well, celebrating their efforts and achievements. This helps children to develop positive self-esteem and be confident to explore their environment. Children know how to keep themselves safe. For example, they learn to take sensible risks outdoors and get safety tips from staff when they go shopping locally. The key-person system is effective. Staff know children well and meet their care needs right from the very beginning. They help them to develop their independence and learn about personal hygiene. Children have nutritious meals and snacks which help them learn about healthy lifestyles. They have regular opportunities to exercise their muscles outdoors and during music sessions where they enjoy dancing and stretching. They behave well and learn to be considerate and respect one another.

#### Outcomes for children are good

Staff help children to be emotionally prepared for their move to school. All children make good progress and learn useful skills for the future. Leaders use additional funding effectively to address identified gaps in children's learning and development.
