# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is outstanding

- Leaders and staff give exceptionally high priority to children's safety and welfare, as well as the safety of activities and the premises.
- Staff have an excellent knowledge and understanding about how children learn and develop. This, along with their inspirational teaching, results in all children making exceptional progress in their learning and development from their starting points.
- The impressive range of accessible resources offers a highly stimulating and rich environment. Children show an eagerness to learn as they investigate, solve problems, explore and lead their own learning. Children are extremely well prepared for their eventual move to school by this exceptionally professional team.
- The well-qualified staff constantly strive to improve their skills and knowledge and enhance their professional development. They use their learning to improve outcomes for children in their care.
- Children thrive at this welcoming and supportive provision. Close attachments between the children and the staff are obvious. Children's behaviour is exceptional.
- Support for disabled children and those who have special educational needs is outstanding.
- Exemplary and reflective evaluation, along with the strong focus on developing the skills and knowledge of staff, results in continuous improvements for children. The emphasis on the quality of teaching, interaction and activities provided has raised the overall standard of the provision remarkably well. Leaders demonstrate an excellent capacity to maintain this quality over time.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

## To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

 continue to enhance the excellent support given to children who speak English as an additional language.

- The inspector viewed all areas of the premises and the toys and resources available.

- The inspector checked the evidence of the suitability and qualifications of adults working with the children.
- The inspector held discussions with the manager and staff at appropriate times during the inspection and spoke to a number of parents.

## **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is outstanding

A very strong management team leads the nursery. They demonstrate a passion and extremely strong drive to improve outcomes for children. The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Staff have an excellent understanding of their roles and responsibilities to protect the children in their care. The manager carries out regular observations of staff, closely monitoring their strengths and identifying areas to enhance their practice. Staff attend a variety of training courses meticulously matched to the learning needs of the children they care for. Parents are significantly valued as partners. They are fully involved in their children's learning in the nursery and are given excellent support to continue this at home. The manager has effective strategies in place to exchange information about children's learning with other providers where care is shared. Managers constantly review the quality of teaching and the activities provided. They have identified the opportunity to further enhance the support they provide to children who speak English as an additional language, in order to maintain the excellent outcomes they already achieve.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Teaching is inspirational. Staff use information obtained from parents and their expert knowledge to identify children's starting points. They maintain exemplary records of children's progress. Staff are highly skilled at interacting with children, listening to what they say and repeating or extending their sentences. Staff stimulate discussion with meaningful questions. The forest area is a key feature of the nursery. Staff use this to provide children of all ages and abilities with interesting, exciting and challenging experiences. Children eagerly create dens and sculptures, as well as exploring nature. They tell their own stories about the characters they make, using a wide range of comparative language. They talk about the shape and size of trees and bushes, and have fun measuring themselves against the low branches. Babies are given time and space to explore and investigate a variety of different resources that keep them engaged for long periods. Staff talk to children about the changing seasons as they play amongst the fallen leaves. Children are provided with solid foundations for their future learning.

## Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Children arrive enthusiastically, ready to play and learn. They show exceptional respect, consideration and thoughtfulness to their friends. Babies benefit from the very attentive care that staff provide. Each child gets expertly tailored care. Children demonstrate their excellent physical skills as they swing from low branches in the forest. They have an excellent knowledge of how to keep themselves safe, explaining to new friends which plants must not be touched. Children show maturity and confidence in being assertive in appropriate situations. For example, whilst waiting for their turn for second helpings, children say, 'it's my turn' when someone tries to take their place.

## **Outcomes for children are outstanding**

Children thrive in this inspirational and all inclusive environment. All children, regardless of their age or ability, make rapid progress in their learning.

Starting Point Childcare Centre was registered in 2010. The nursery employs 18 members of childcare staff. Of these, all hold appropriate early years qualifications between level 2 and level 6. The centre opens from Monday to Friday all year round. Sessions are from 8am until 6pm. The centre provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children. It supports disabled children, those with special educational needs and those who speak English as an additional language.

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
