## **Summary of key findings for parents**

## This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- The childminder has not ensured that she holds a current and valid first-aid certificate.
- Sometimes, the childminder does not extend children's thinking as well as possible during their play through missing chances to question them.
- The childminder does not always make the most of experiences to develop children's understanding of the world around them.

## It has the following strengths

- The children benefit from a good range of challenging activities and play experiences. As a result, children make consistent progress in their learning from their starting points.
- The childminder knows the children well. She uses regular assessments of children's learning to help check their progress and to share with parents. She encourages contributions to learning from home.
- Children are happy, settled and enjoy their time with the childminder.
- Self-evaluation is effective and includes the views of parents. The childminder identifies areas of improvement in her practice and works on these. She has addressed the previous inspection's recommendations to improve aspects of her practice.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management requires improvement

The childminder does not fully meet her responsibility with regard to legal requirements. She has not maintained a current first-aid certificate at all times. However, safeguarding is effective. The childminder has had first-aid training previously and, therefore, the breach of requirements has not had a significant impact on children's care. The childminder has attended safeguarding training and has secure knowledge of child protection procedures, policies and practice. The childminder carries out regular risk assessments and ensures her home environment is safe for the children. The childminder has strong partnerships with parents, which contribute well to children's learning and development. She has developed her teaching methods further since the previous inspection.

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## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder has made improvements in her observation, assessment and planning. These include children's next steps in their learning effectively. For example, children use mathematical language and equipment during a cooking activity to further develop their understanding of mathematical concepts. Useful planned play supports children's development of language and communication skills well. The younger children gain and understanding of routine practices and new words when the childminder explains what she does. Children practise physical skills through activities that encourage walking, balancing and developing their hand-to-eye coordination well. Children enjoy singing and happily engage in a range of musical experiences as part of their creative development.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

The childminder works well with parents to support children's individual needs and to promote their well-being, but not all the welfare and safeguarding requirements are met. She understands the roles of other professionals and agencies in supporting children and knows where to find further information. Children behave well. They develop independence through regular exploration and play. Children develop understanding of what it means to be healthy through discussion and practice. They enjoy healthy snacks and physical activity through regular outdoor experiences, for example to local parks and play centres. Hygiene and care practices are appropriate at providing children with opportunities to develop their confidence and self-care. For example, children learn to wash their hands before cooking. They learn that they are different from each other, such as having different birthdays, which they celebrate.

## **Outcomes for children are good**

Children make good progress in their learning. They are keen to join in activities, such as cooking. Children learn useful skills in preparation for moving to school. For example, they learn about numbers, develop their writing skills and recognise some of different letters' sounds.
